Morocco Leather. Sumac, the powdered leaf of the sumac plant, the finest varieties of which grow in Sicily, is used in tanning goatskins, and sumac gives a clear, white tannage, unaffected by the action of light and therefore suitable for dyeing into colors where permanence of shade is desired. A genuine "morocco" is goatskin tanned with pure sumac, but there are many upholders who could not give this definition offhand. Goatskins dyed with babool pods or similar barks are only imitation moroccoes, although it takes an expert to discover the difference. Long wear, of course, reveals the deception. Roan leathers are sumac tanned sheepskins.—Manchester Guardian.

Many firms lose in Philadelphia this morning. Result of Immense Fire in Philadelphia This Morning. BUSINESS BLOCK RUINED. Philadelphia, April 3.—Seventeen firms suffered losses aggregating half a million dollars by fire, which destroyed the entire block bounded by Front, Laurel, Haydock and Frankford streets this morning. The fire followed an explosion in Rangano and Hall's trunk factory.

Cambridge Lost Boat Contest To Rival University's Strong Crew. Putney, Eng., April 3.—Oxford won from Cambridge in their sixty-sixth annual eight-oared rowing race on the river Thames today. Oxford won by more than three boat lengths, time 19 minutes and 50 seconds. The race was closely contested throughout. An immense holiday crowd had massed and Cambridge was the favorite before the starting.

ALONZO GIRTON NOW HAS A BANK. Establishes One in a Thriving Oil Town. Alonzo Girtin of this city has just returned from Buckland, Ohio, where he organized a citizens' bank. The town is in the oil belt and one of the most prosperous for its size in the state. It has about 600 inhabitants and as there are no banks within eight miles of the place, he thinks it is a splendid venture. The furniture of the Richmond Trust company has been disposed of to the new organization.

VOTE ON TARIFF MEASURE MONDAY. Announcement Is Made Following Conference. Washington, April 3.—After conference with Taft, representative Dwight announced this morning notices will be sent out for all members in the present congress to vote on the tariff bill, Monday.

REMODELING WORK HAS NOW STARTED. Rear of Colonial Building Being Torn Out. Work on tearing out the interior of the rear part of the Colonial building, which was destroyed by fire a year ago next Thursday, was commenced yesterday. The work is under the supervision of E. M. Campfield, who is representing the Indianapolis Trust company, which organization is trustee of the property. The work will be rushed to completion and it is probable that within the next six months this section of the building will be ready for occupancy.
