### GOVERNMENT WILL HELP MAKE ROAD

If Model Highway Is Built in  
County, Uncle Sam Will  
Supervise Work.

### PETITION BEARS FRUIT

ACTION TAKEN BY GOVERNMENT  
AS RESULT OF AGITATION  
MADE LAST SUMMER AND LO-  
CAL ROADS CONGRESS.

Co-operation with the county commissioners in the construction of a mile of model government road will be given by the United States government, according to a letter received today by Postmaster J. A. Speckhauer, from J. E. Pennybacker, acting director of the bureau of public roads, department of agriculture. Mr. Pennybacker promised to send an engineer to this city to oversee the work, providing it was started at once. His communication was forwarded to the county commissioners.

This is the first result of a petition signed by a number of local citizens and road officials of Wayne and Preble counties with the Kentucky Colonels, a team whose reputation is general. The Colonels were not reorganized for the season of 1900 and Manager Welage of the Blues quickly copped out the pick of the team.
