## GOVERNMENT WILL HELP MAKE ROAD

If Model Highway Is Built in County, Uncle Sam Will Supervise Work.

### PETITION BEARS FRUIT

ACTION TAKEN BY GOVERNMENT AS RESULT OF AGITATION MADE LAST SUMMER AND LOCAL ROADS CONGRESS.

Co-operation with the county commissioners in the construction of a mile of model government road will be given by the United States government, according to a letter received today by Postmaster J. A. Spekenhler, from J. E. Pennypacker, acting director of the bureau of public roads, department of agriculture. Mr. Pennypacker promised to send an engineer to this city to oversee the work, providing it was started at once. His communication was forwarded to the county commissioners.

This is the first result of a petition signed by a number of local citizens and road officials of Wayne and Preble counties at the Good Roads congress held at the court house last August. The petitioners asked that the department construct a mile of good road and M. O. Eldridge, the government official, who addressed the Good Roads congress, promised to do all in his power to have favorable action taken by the department officials.

Uncle Sam's Share. Providing the commissioners decide to accept the government's offer, it is probable that the Preble county officials will also be asked to co-operate, and a half mile of the road be built in each county on the National road. The expense would be borne equally by the two counties and be a benefit to each.

The only expense the government will meet will be that of sending an engineer here to oversee the work. The other expenses, such as for materials, the employment of teamsters and other laborers, must be borne by the county. The city officials have consented to allow the steam roller to be used in connection with the construction of the road.

## CITY ATTORNEY RENDERS ADVICE

Tells City Officials to Act Slow In Heating Franchise Matter.

### ONE PER CENT FOR CITY

ONLY THIS AMOUNT OF GROSS EARNINGS OFFERED — EGGE-MEYER WITHDRAWS HIS SUPPORT FROM THE PROJECT.

The board of public works was advised by City Attorney Study this afternoon to act slowly in regard to the proposed franchise for a steam heating company. The latest proposition is by the company which offers one per cent of its gross receipts. That means if the company's business amounted to \$100,000, during the year the city would receive \$1,000. There is no provision about providing heat for the city buildings and it is to this fact the city attorney has called attention. He says he would not have anything to do with any franchise unless this is made a part of it.

### City Not a Gainer.

Every year the city pays some \$300 for heating the city building and the hose houses. If the company be given a franchise, the city attorney thinks it ought to be required to heat these buildings. It is provided in the proposed franchise that the city will obtain a per cent of the gross receipts but if these receipts should be very small and the city given no heat for its buildings, the city would not be an appreciable gainer, although it had permitted its streets to be torn up and the company to have a franchise.

Eggemeyer Withdraws. Other developments have appeared in the franchise matter. It was stated to the board of public works that George Eggemeyer, one of the original promoters in the Central Stationary Engineering Company's attempt to secure a contract, has withdrawn his financial support from the deal. Mr. Eggemeyer was quoted as saying he believed the company was to be in the interest of local capital, but as it has developed outside capital is to be thrown into the breach he will not care to permit his name to be used for the sake of outside capitalists.

A special meeting of council is talked of for Monday night. The call is to be issued if the board of works signs the contract. It is believed that there is no great immediate need of such haste. The general public knows nothing of the provisions of the proposed franchise. The franchise has not even been submitted for publication and will not be before tomorrow. There will not be time enough between Saturday and Monday for the public to read the franchise, discuss it and inform the representatives in city council of the sentiment. There is no actual need for this precipitate haste.

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## ROBBINS-GORDON CASE NOT HEARD

Editor Remains Unable to Appear in City Court.

The aftermath of the street fight between Byram Robbins and Bennett Gordon will be in city court tomorrow afternoon. Gordon was unable to appear again today and another continuance was granted. The prosecutor has not decided on the charges he will prefer.
