**TO PAY CREDITORS**  
Fort Madison, Iowa, May 25.—Assignee H. J. Schroeder of the defunct West Point (Ia.) Bank, which failed on February 18, 1908, has announced that all creditors would be paid in full on May 28. The liabilities are \$124,791. Riley Smith of Hancock county, Ills., president of the bank, gave up all his personal property to liquidate the indebtedness.

**Food Economy in Hotels.**  
"Popular opinion is that half of the foodstuffs purchased by a hotel is wasted," said an assistant manager of the Plaza hotel. "Now, that is not true. A large hotel employs experts who plan so cleverly that almost everything is used from day to day. Take the bread, for instance. What is not used at once is used later for the employees and also for making the toasts on which many special meat and other dishes are served. Cakes are made up according as the demand is for the day. It is known that there will be a greater demand on matinee days, when the tea garden and the restaurants are crowded. Don't believe too much about the waste."—New York Herald.

**ARTHUR N. CURZON**

**IS IN LIMELIGHT**

Notorious Spendthrift and His Wife Are Figuring in Frisco.

**BEING DUNNED FOR DEBTS**

SINCE THEIR MARRIAGE IN MARCH CURZON AND WIFE HAVE FIGURED IN QUITE A FEW "HIGH TIMES."

San Francisco, Cal., May 25.—Arthur N. Curzon, of Ontario, Canada, said to be a cousin of Lord Curzon, former viceroy of India and his wife, Evelyn Curzon, formerly Mrs. Evelyn Pittman, who has figured more than once as the breaker of men's hearts, are again in the limelight. This time, after having been freely dunned for a promissory note for \$250 by E. G. Bonetti, who took a mortgage upon a large amount of furniture, suit to foreclose the mortgage has been brought in the superior court. The action was begun yesterday by James K. Burch, to whom the note was assigned.

His Money Flowed.  
Lavish expenditures on automobiles and wine preceding the marriage, which occurred in March, are said to have led Curzon and his bride into the civil courts. It also developed that extensive arrangements had been made to furnish a home in this city by the couple, but the furniture, it appears, never got further than a fireproof storage house, where it is now being held. Mahogany bed room and dining room sets, a well equipped buffet and an adequate supply of chairs and tables are included in the list of furniture, which Burch seeks to obtain in payment of the promissory note.

Since the marriage in March—which was a nine-days' wonder—Curzon and his wife have figured in several escapades. Recently, Curzon was arrested at Ocean Park, near Los Angeles, on a charge of drunkenness. His spouse declared that a cell was a good place for him and she then disappeared and it is believed the matrimonial career of the couple is now at an end.

**FIGHT IN MOROCCO.**  
Tangier, Morocco, May 25.—In a battle between the Sultan's troops and the Beni Mitr tribesmen, 25 soldiers were killed and sixty wounded. The tribesmen lost heavily when a fierce artillery fire butchered them.
