OLD MISSIONARY HOME FROM INDIA

Pastor of Old Pearl Street Church Returns After Forty-seven Years.

NATIVE OF WAYNE COUNTY

SUNDAY HE WILL SPEAK AT THE GRACE AND FIRST M. E. CHURCHES—TO BE GIVEN RECEPTION MONDAY.

After forty-seven years as a missionary in India, the Rev. T. S. Johnson at one time pastor of the old Pearl Street M. E., now the First M. E. church, has returned to this county. He is a native Wayne countian but the large part of his life has been spent in the interest of the gospel in foreign lands. At present he is visiting his sister, Mrs. Alpheus Cook, of near Williamsburg. He expects to go to Iowa to make his future home with a son.

The Rev. Mr. Johnson will be remembered by the older members of the Fifth Street church and other Methodists. His experience in the mission work and the amount of time he has devoted to it qualify him to speak authoritatively of the progress being made. He will come to this city from Williamsburg tomorrow and be the guest of the Rev. and Mrs. Nelson of Grace church. He will deliver a sermon at Grace church Sunday morning, and at the First M. E. church Sunday night. He will be given a reception at that church Monday night.

A City of Changes.
Cattaro, the Austrian sea gate of Montenegro, was held by Montenegro once for a little time. Montenegro acquired it in 1813 with the aid of a British squadron. Any inhabitant of Cattaro who was contemporary with the rise and fall of Napoleon must often have had to pause and think what country he belonged to, for, having been Venetian for centuries, Cattaro became Austrian by the treaty of Campo Formio and Italian in 1805 by the peace of Presburg. It was absorbed in the French empire in 1810 and wrested from it in 1813, and finally in 1814 Russia compelled Montenegro to give it up to Austria.
