The story was accepted here and he es-  
caped punishment. He went to Day-  
ton, where his wife secured a divorce  
and was arrested at Rushville, a few  
days ago in company with a woman,  
who left him when the officers appear-  
ed. He passed a forged check at Con-  
nersville.

## NO EFFORT MADE LAND CONVENTION

Prompt Action Needed to Get  
1910 Municipal League  
Meeting.

ONLY TWO WEEKS REMAIN

THIS YEAR'S CONVENTION WILL  
BE HELD IN A FORTNIGHT AT  
LAFAYETTE—IT IS UP TO THE  
Y. M. S. CLUB.

With the Indiana Municipal League  
meeting but two weeks off, no ar-  
rangements have been made to boost  
the project to secure the 1910 conven-  
tion for Richmond, which is possible  
according to Mayor Richard Schilling-  
er, who is a member of several of the  
more important committees. The mat-  
ter was referred to by Councilman  
Williams last evening at the council  
meeting, following the appropriation  
of \$150, on suspension of the rules, to  
be used in paying the expenses of the  
city officials who desire to attend this  
summer's convention at Lafayette,  
June 22, 23, 24. Mayor Schilling-  
er signed the ordinance appropriating  
this amount.

The Young Men's Business club has  
had the matter under consideration  
but never taken final action. It seems  
that Mayor Schilling-er referred the  
matter to this organization without  
giving it his personal attention. It is  
probable that this club will take some  
action in regard to holding the conven-  
tion here next summer, at its meeting  
this evening.

Vote Larger Sum.

The "junker" appropriation is high-  
er than usual. In past years \$100 has  
been considered sufficient to meet the  
expense of the official junket. In sev-  
eral instances the entire appropriation  
has not been used. Last summer  
when the convention was held at La-  
fayette the expense to the city was \$147  
although but \$100 was appropriated,  
the surplus being money in the treas-  
ury not used in the past.

The city owes the league \$15 in  
dues, according to a communication  
received from Secretary L. W. Mel-  
lette, and read at the council meeting.  
The matter was referred to the board  
of works with instructions to pay the  
account.

The report of the 1908 convention at  
Lafayette was distributed among the  
city officials last evening. The report  
is very voluminous, covering every  
phase of the convention.
