Thaw is Unconcerned.
Thaw attached little importance to his wife's testimony.

"It is very plain to everyone that her story is not true," he said. "I am not worried at anything Evelyn said. She knows she is not telling the truth. I never threatened to kill her. First she says one thing, and then another."

Following her testimony, Evelyn Thaw made this statement:

"I know what will happen to me

now. I will simply have to go out and get a job somewhere, for my income will be cut off. I will never be forgiven for what I did."

When told of this statement, Thaw said:

"I have positively no animosity against young Mrs. Thaw for her testimony, and she did not fear that her five hundred dollars a month will be cut off.
