Good Things to Burn.

There were dozens of private picnic parties. In fact nearly every little dell and nook afforded in the acres of woodland was occupied. Of course the good things to eat and in most cases the good looks of the cooks was responsible for many of the gatherings. A hungry man who wandered about through the park and saw all those hundreds of baskets breaking the hands with their weight looked and longed for a bite. He even felt worse when he visited the animal cages and saw the beasts being fed scraps of cake.

With each succeeding influx of visitors to the park there is an increasing demand for better street car accommodations. Cars clear over into the park are being asked for. To see women unassisted carrying heavy picnic baskets from the street car entrances to the tables in the back of the park, a full mile, makes the need for trackage further into the park more evident. There is plenty of unused ground to the north of the lake on which the street car company could extend its tracks. There would be no despoilation of nature's beauty and the material benefit to the general public would be of inestimable benefit.

EATON, OHIO.

Eaton, O., July 22.—Clarence Gullett, a young man living with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. Gullett, about three miles south of Eaton, has been confined in the county jail for the past few days, having been arrested because his father filed a warrant because he thought the young man insane. The elder Gullett attempted to chastise a younger boy of his family Monday and the one arrested on a sanity charge took exceptions to the matter and started to interfere for his brother. A quarrel between the father and the elder son ensued, and the latter secured a 38-calibre revolver and threatened his father. The father became frightened at the threats made to him and other members of his family and fled from their home. The accused son was given a hearing this morning in the probate court before Judge Arthur D. Davis.

Mrs. Serena Allen, the oldest woman in Preble county, died Tuesday at the county infirmary where she had been an inmate for two or three years. She was aged 96 years. Her death was the result of infirmities incident to one of her advanced years. For several years she had been an invalid, being totally blind. Mrs. Allen is survived by four daughters, two of whom, Mrs. William Sheffer and Mrs. David North, live in Eaton. Her body will be taken to Centerville, Ind., her former home, where funeral and burial will take place Thursday.
