Lord Rathmore told a friend how he once took Ouida in to dinner and how disappointed he was to find that the novelist devoted herself to the dishes rather than to intellectual refreshment. Jupiter Warmer Than the Earth.
"The gigantic mass of Jupiter has a much larger warmth than that of the earth," says a scientific writer. "It is the result of the molecular movement produced by the compression of the strata and must be greater the more powerful the masses and hence the larger the pressure of the strata is. Jupiter surpasses the earth in point of mass 307 times, and for this reason the inner temperature or individual warmth of the planet is probably high enough to evaporate the water upon the surface quickly, so that water vapor forms the principal substance of the atmosphere of Jupiter. Water vapor is an excellent reflector and readily accounts for the bright radiation of light emitted by the planet."

CHAUFFEUR FINED IN COURT TODAY

First Entered Plea of Not Guilty But He Soon Withdrawed It.

POLICE START CAMPAIGN

WILL STRICTLY ENFORCE ORDINANCE AGAINST FAST DRIVING—BAN ON SPEEDERS AT GLEN MILLER PARK.

Harry Paschke, Harry Starr's chauffeur, who was arrested Wednesday evening for violating the speed law, was fined \$5 and costs in the city court this afternoon. Paschke entered a plea of not guilty at first, but when it was made known that witnesses could be produced who would testify that he had exceeded the speed limit on several different occasions, the wisdom of changing his plea to guilty became apparent. However, Paschke declared that he was not exceeding the speed limit when arrested, but admitted that he had violated the law in this respect on some of the side streets prior to his arrest.

Against Speeders.
The conviction of Paschke has acted as an appetizer for the police, who declare that they are going after these law violators now with a vim. Superintendent Klopff of Glen Miller states that automobile owners are becoming exceedingly reckless in driving through the Glen. In view of the fact that there are no sidewalks, and people walking through the Glen are forced to use the driveways, it is very necessary that drivers of automobiles should exercise great care in passing through the park. The law provides a maximum speed of six miles an hour in parks and it is said that the law on this point will be rigidly enforced.

The fire escapes that were ordered by the state authorities on school buildings of the city have been accepted. The buildings on which they were placed are: Vail, Whitewater, Fairview, Warner, Baxter and Earlham College.

IS A BIG CONTRACT

Greenfield Firm Gets Job For Making South A Street Improvement.

LARGEST ONE EVER LET

The contract for improving South A street from Second to Twenty-first was awarded to Booth & Gant, of Greenfield. It is the largest single contract improvement ever awarded by the city. The total cost will be more than \$13,000. The contract price is divided as follows: walks 57 cents; circular curb 65 cents; straight curb 54 cents; sidewalk intersections 10 cents square foot; alley intersections, same; cross walks 50 cents lineal foot.

Arthur Sanders, a seventeen year old colored boy, was fined \$5 and costs in city court this afternoon for assault and battery on Joe Godsey. The latter boy testified to his persecution by the negro. Sanders, so Godsey said, has been accustomed to pound him about at leisure. Sanders had been in petty trouble before and had been given opportunities by the court to mend his ways.

ENTERS COMPLAINT.

Complaint was made to the police today by the manager of a local moving picture theater because free picture shows are being given at Ninth and Main streets. These free attractions are given as advertising ventures, advertisements being interspersed on the program. The theater manager doesn't like the public to see pictures for nothing.
