

## ROPE ON HIS NECK WHEN COP ARRIVED

Narrow Escape of a Driver  
Whose Wagon Ran Over  
A Small Child.

## A POLICEMAN TO RESCUE

HE MOUNTED THE WAGON AND  
MADE AN ADDRESS TO MOB OF  
FRENZIED ITALIANS, CALMING  
THEIR PASSIONS.

New York, July 29.—Standing on the high seat of a lumber truck in East One Hundred and Sixth street last night Policeman Frank Duffy made an impassioned appeal in their own language to a frenzied crowd of Italians, who sought vengeance upon Oscar Freiberg, driver of the wagon, which had fatally crushed Felipo Mustapo, 2 years old. Duffy's command of Italian saved the driver, for a rope had already been procured and the life of the frightened man was in peril.

Freiberg was driving through East 106th street, when a child ran directly under the horses' hoofs. In an instant the truck was surrounded by a crowd composed of both sexes clamoring for vengeance. Freiberg had the presence of mind to crack his whip at the bolder ones, who tried to climb up. Some one suggested lynching, and by the time an ambulance from the Harlem hospital arrived to carry away the child the situation was growing serious.

### Pushed Through Crowd.

Then Duffy pushed his way through the crowd, mounting to the side of the frightened driver. He saw a rope dangling from the hand of a man in the crowd, and knew he had no time to lose.

With one hand holding the shoulder of Freiberg he used the other for the purpose of gesticulating, and in Italian assured the shouting mob that he was in sympathy with them, and that summary punishment would be visited upon the driver for the loss of the child's life, but it could not be done there, he contended in the presence of women and children. He urged those seeking vengeance to follow him and see justice done.

There was a chorus of approval, and as the policeman himself took the reins and started for the 164th street station the mob ran after. But when they got there something happened. Duffy and his charge disappeared within the doors before any one realized it, and a moment later a squad of men with clubs surged down the steps and cleared the streets.

## ELLIS RETURNED TO JAIL

Little Rock, Ark., July 29.—W. Y. Ellis, the young Pine Bluff (Ark.) manufacturer, who shot and killed Nathaniel P. Willis, of Indianapolis, his wife's divorced husband, in court at Little Rock, Tuesday, is again in jail here, having been brought back here secretly last night from the state's strongest jail at Newport, to which he was smuggled for safety.

His relatives and friends at a conference decided last night to waive examination when Ellis is arraigned. Five leading attorneys from various parts of Arkansas will defend him.

United States Senator Jeff Davis denied last night that he will prosecute Ellis, but expressed the belief that Ellis went to the court room to kill Willis, and his counsel, too, if necessary.

Davis, who was Willis's attorney, when asked how he escaped being shot, replied: "God cares for His own."

Willis's mother, who attempted to get between Willis and Ellis when the former was killed, says she is sorry she was not shot. She continually calls for her son, and pleads to know if he is dead.

L. C. Willis, the murdered man's brother and A. R. King, of the Indianapolis Star, arrived here last night and will take Willis's body to Indianapolis for burial.

## FARMER IS INSANE OVER BLACK HAND

Sent to the Easthaven Insane Hospital.

Application has been received at Easthaven for the admittance of Charles Nicholson, a Wells county farmer, who imagines he is being pursued by the "black hand" society. Besides his one hallucination, Nicholson appears to be perfectly sane. He claims he is being persecuted by the "black hand" and that he is controlled by its dictates. He believes he has been ordered to kill his entire family and must obey the command. It is necessary to keep the man under constant guard.

## TEST IS POSTPONED

Wrights Given Three Days More to Make Trip to Alexandria.

## BREEZE WAS TOO STRONG

Washington, July 29.—Orville Wright was granted last night a three days' extension of time for his official endurance flight, the second crucial test in his contract with the government. Orville's failure to make the overland journey from Ft. Myer to Alexandria, Va., and return, a distance of five miles each way at 40 miles an hour proved a keen disappointment to President Taft and the big crowd of expectant spectators.

The postponement of the flight was due to the strong wind, twelve-mile breeze blowing until darkness set in, and also because the engine failed to work properly. A short flight was made about the drill grounds.

Orville Wright last night gave it as his opinion that he would have to maintain an average height of at least 200 feet throughout the flight in order to clear the various hillocks dotting the territory to be traversed.
