TO LIGHT NEW PARIS

Ashe Secures Contract for Supplying Town With Electricity.

Robert Ashe of this city has been tendered a franchise for the lighting of the streets of New Paris by electricity. Provisions are made in the ordinance for the use of the power for commercial and private residence purposes. Mr. Ashe will endeavor to gain a concession from the Wayne county and Preble county commissioners to use the highways between this city and New Paris. A local light plant will furnish the power if Mr. Ashe accepts the franchise.

The town of New Paris will be lighted with twenty-five street arcs for which the municipality pays \$4 per month. The contract runs for a period of 10 years. The ordinance provides that rates ranging from 6 to 12 cents be charged the private consumers according to the amount used. All residents who use the power must use 75 cents worth as this price is a minimum.

STREETS TO BE LIGHTED

The fire department was called to the home of William Cook, 715 South Sixth street, this morning to extinguish a small blaze in the roof of the house. The fire was probably caused by a spark from a locomotive on the C. C. & L. railroad, it is said. The flame was quickly extinguished and only about \$50 damage was done.

SCHOOL BOARDS REPORT.

The school boards of Richmond, Dublin, Hagerstown, Spring Grove, Cambridge City and Milton have failed to report their organization by August 5 as required by the law. The school boards should organize in August and report to the auditor before August 5. County Superintendent Jordan stated that the irregularity would not greatly affect matters. The Centerville corporation is the only one to have reported on time.

BAILEY IS DIRECTOR

Elected at Meeting of Telephone Toll Clearing Association Yesterday.

A REDUCTION OF RATES

At the meeting of the stock holders and directors of the Toll and Clearing Association at Indianapolis yesterday the question of establishing a uniform long distance telephone rate was considered, but no definite action decided upon. W. M. Bailey, manager of the local telephone company, was in attendance and elected a member of the board of directors. He stated today that the directors considered the advisability of establishing a two-thirds of a cent a mile telephone rate. For calls of short distances, this rate will not be possible but when calls of comparatively long distances are made this rate will be maintained.

WOMAN PASSENGER

An unknown woman who refused to give her name was given the first ride in the new covered patrol wagon this morning. The wagon has been overhauled and painted. It has a top too new and looks just as good as new. All of the policemen were wondering who would get the first ride, but in all the surmises the thought that a woman would be the first "victim" never entered their heads. The woman in question was arrested at South Seventh and H street for intoxication and she evidently did not appreciate the honor being bestowed upon her.

BEING PROSECUTED

John H. Wadsworth, a former liveryman of this city, is being prosecuted in the circuit court on a charge of fraudulent marriage to Ida G. Wadsworth, whom it is alleged he married in order to avoid paternity proceedings. The case is being heard by a jury. It will probably require two or three days to hear the case. The wife wants \$600 judgment.
