A PAVILION MAY
BE CONSTRUCTED

Cost of Renting Tent Would Warrant Contracting Expense.

IMPROVE ACCOMMODATIONS

CHAUTAUQUA MANAGERS ARE CONSIDERING MAKING THE NEEDED IMPROVEMENT FOR NEXT YEAR'S EVENT.

Owing to the expense attached to renting the assembly tent for the chautauqua, officials of the Richmond Chautauqua association are considering the advisability of erecting a pavilion this year in which future assemblies will be held. The expense of renting the tent is almost sufficient to pay the interest on the required capital to build a pavilion. Officials state that the matter depends largely on the success of the chautauqua this year.

A pavilion would furnish better accommodations than the assembly tent, especially in wet weather. Therefore officers say the attendance will be increased. The association each year has made from \$200 to \$1,000 and now has a large amount in a special fund in the city treasury. It was the intention of the management in charge of the first chautauqua which practically remains intact, that a pavilion be erected as soon as sufficient money had been made.

The plan for the reservation of camp sites was opened to the public this morning. A large number who did not camp last year have already spoken for sites this year and it is the belief of the officials that there will be twice the number of campers this year over the number last year.

The trustee of Webster township, Wayne county, Indiana, proposes for the next year's expenditures and tax levies by the Advisory Board, at its annual meeting to be held at the trustees office, Tuesday, September 6, 1910, at 9 o'clock a. m. the following estimates and amounts for the said year.

1. Township expenditures \$780.16, and township tax 17 cents on the hundred dollars.

2. Local tuition expenditures \$1,239.05 and local tuition tax 27 cents on the hundred dollars.

3. Special school expenditures \$1,335.64 and special school tax 40 cents on the hundred dollars.

4. Road expenditures \$917.82 and road tax 20 cents on the hundred dollars to be worked out on the highway.

5. Additional road expenditures \$458.91 and road tax 10 cents on the hundred dollars to be paid as taxes.

6. Bond expenditures \$917.82, tax 20 cents on the hundred dollars.

7. The total expenditures recommended \$6,149.40 and total tax levy 134 cents on the hundred dollars.
