MARKET CONDITIONS TODAY

CHICAGO MARKETS.

Chicago, Sept. 13.—

Wheat—Today's wheat market has displayed considerable strength. The December advancing almost 2 cents in the face of rather bearish run of news and record receipts in northwest. The crowd got short only in anticipation of a break in prices, being run in later as the demand from commission houses and leading operators absorbed offerings. Market in our opinion, while not in a very bullish position from a crop standpoint, is no longer in a bearish position. Believe the situation has been fully discounted and look to see a good trading market for awhile, with purchases of the December and May on the weak spots the most profitable.

Corn—Fine weather over Sunday brought out considerable long corn early, market easing off slightly but firming up toward the close of session as shorts covered on the strength in wheat and on good buying by commission houses and local operators. While present prices may discount the situation in corn for the moment, we believe the market will eventually sell higher, and favor purchases of the December and May on every little decline.
