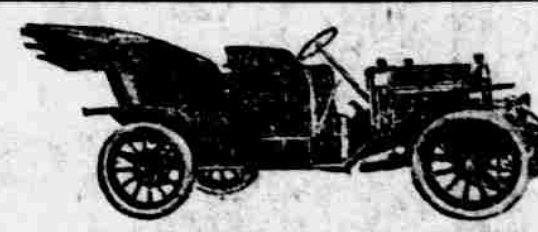

CHURCH LOSES ITS
ANTI-NOISE SUIT

Leavenworth Congregation Must Continue to Endure Railroad Uproar.

STICK TO THE OLD SITE

MEMBERS REFUSED TO SELL THE PROPERTY THOUGH IT IS SURROUNDED BY NETWORK OF PUFFING TRAINS.

Leavenworth, Kan., Sept. 25.—Hundreds of persons in Leavenworth outside the congregation of the First Methodist church have often wondered why the congregation persisted in remaining in its present church at Fifth and Choctaw streets.

Choctaw street is wholly given up to railroads, and more than fifty freight and passenger trains, to say nothing of a switch engine every few minutes, use the tracks. Across the street, directly south, is the passenger station of the Chicago Great Western railway and also a water crane, where every train that comes along stops for water.

Across Fifth street, directly east, is the passenger station of the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy railroad. A street car line runs along Fifth street.

When the locomotive bells are not ringing the locomotives are blowing off steam or a double header freight train is puffing up the grade from the west. With these noises and the clatter from the street cars and the traffic in Fifth street it is rarely that the congregation of the First Methodist church can hear more than half what the preacher says or tell what the choir is singing.

The congregation has had many opportunities to sell the property, and at prices that were judged by outsiders to be more than the property is worth, but the congregation has stayed on and endured the racket and din, and why only the congregation knows. Several times suit has been brought against the railroads, but invariably the church has lost.

INTEREST TO ARMY

Washington, D. C., Sept. 25.—American military officials and the foreign embassies and legations here, are acutely interested in a new automobile wireless telegraph apparatus, which has been perfected in France and just given its first practical tests by officers of the French central military telegraph service.

Commander Ferle and his assistants Captains Brenot and Broques, apparently have solved the problem that so long perplexed military experts that of contriving a motor car that would be sufficiently light in weight to be speedy and yet transport all the necessary material.

The car, which is of limousin form, with removable sides, is divided in two compartments; in front is the delicate apparatus and at the back are a five-horse power dynamo, normally used at 3-horsepower, the receivers and the manipulator. A 22-horse power motor is provided to propel the vehicle.

A telescopic contrivance invented by M. Cassanova facilitates immediate mounting of the mast, from the summit of which depend five wires. Four of these are about 150 feet long and terminate in an isolated strand that is fixed in the ground. The fifth establishes a circuit with the others, and is attached to the car, where it is united to the interior apparatus.

WRIGHT MAKES TEST

(American News Service)
New York, Sept. 25.—Wilbur Wright today tested the motor of the aeroplane which he is to use in his flights next week. The machine is a complicated affair, some of the parts having been used in the earliest aeroplanes and used by the Wrights in their experiments at Kitty Hawk. The propellers were those used by Orville Wright on the machine which was wrecked at Fort Meyer a year ago.

COMPANY CLOSES
DEAL FOR SWITCH

New Automatic Concern Finally Comes to Terms of C., C. & L.

BIDS ON THE BUILDING

MONDAY THEY WILL BE OPENED AND THE CONTRACT TO CONSTRUCT THE PLANT WILL THEN BE AWARDED.

The C., C. & L. switch, for the National Automatic Tool works, which company will locate its new plant in Beallview after the first of the year, has been secured and now all preliminary arrangements for the factory's establishment have been completed. A conference between officials of the tool company and Harry C. Starr, representative of the railroad company, was held yesterday afternoon, at which time it was decided to run the switch into the company's plant from the east instead of from the north, as desired by the tool company officials.

William Buckhoff, president of the tool company, stated that the company had been holding out in hopes that the railroad would place the switch, so that it would enter the factory building from the north. Had this arrangement been carried out the switch would have run through the center of the factory and would have been most inconvenient. However, the railroad company refused to consider such an arrangement and it was a case of either following the company's wishes or doing without the switch. Hence the switch will enter the factory building from the east.

Let Contract Monday.
The contract for the new factory building will be let Monday afternoon. There have been several contractors inspecting the plans and the bidding is expected to be close. The building will be the most modern factory structure in the city, according to the plan. It will be reinforced concrete throughout.
