**WHOLESALE FRAUD
IS PERPETRATED**

Some Flour Mills in the State
Are Now Under an In-
vestigation.

SHORT WEIGHT IS GIVEN

THIS CHARGE HAS BEEN MADE
BY SOME OF THE STATE FOOD
INSPECTORS, WHO HAVE TOUR-
ED THE ENTIRE STATE.

(Palladium Special)
Indianapolis, Oct. 7.—The state food department has discovered what it regards as a wholesale fraud being perpetrated by many of the flour mills in the state. One of the state food inspectors has made a tour of the state to investigate the flour business, and he has reported back to the state board of health that out of the samples from one hundred mills he found more than a majority of them giving short weight.

Most of the flour sold in this state is put up in one-eighth barrel bags, which should weigh 24½ pounds. In nearly all instances, this inspector reports, the bags weigh from a few ounces to two or three pounds short.

Pittsburg Is Baseball Crazy
And the Players Get
Assistance.

DETROIT READY FOR WORK

TIGER TEAM ARRIVED ON HOST-
TILE GROUND TODAY AND AP-
PEAR IN FINE SHAPE—CAMNITZ
IN BAD HEALTH.

Pittsburg, Oct. 7.—Pittsburg last night practically abandoned business and turned to baseball, the world's series, which begins here Friday. The Detroit American League champions arrived here this morning and will indulge in secret practice during the day on Forbes Field. The Pittsburg team already has put in hours of secret work and will rest until the opening clash on Friday afternoon.

Through the courtesy of the officials of Greater Pittsburg, Forbes Field is being enlarged to take in a section of Schenley park, a city property. Bleachers are being erected on the park slope, and this, in a great measure, will eradicate the application of ground rules during the championship games. Premiums on seats at Friday's and Saturday's games are being offered on the streets.

The entire Pittsburg team is not in the best possible condition. Pitcher Camnitz may not work, as he is suffering from quinsy. With only one day intervening before the battle is begun interest is becoming keen.

One of the pleasures of the post-season series in Pittsburg is the fact that the local games will be decided in the greatest ball park in the country. Every preparation has been made to make the \$1,000,000 grounds adequate for handling the anticipated record-breaking crowds. Over a score of street car lines run to Forbes Field and special schedules are to be arranged. In addition, the Pennsylvania and Baltimore and Ohio railroads are in a position to take passengers within a few minutes' walk of the park.

A number of out-of-town spectators arrived here today. The main body is expected tomorrow. All the celebrities of the baseball circle will be here, together with many thousand baseball enthusiasts.

THEATER WILL OPEN

No Material Damage Done to
Structure by Recent
Accident.

NO FAULT IN THE BUILDING

The accident at the New Murray theater this week will in no way interfere with the opening of the play house. No material damage was done to the building by the falling of the large electric sign which Sign Painter Swain was putting in place. Only a portion of the coping at the top of the building, and above the roof, was torn away. Contractor Pass sent for brick layers this morning and the coping will be rebuilt at once.

After an inspection it has been found that the accident was due to the improper method used in hoisting the heavy sign. The block and tackle was not properly anchored and the entire weight of the sign was on the coping. The coping, like all such, in no way supports the roof, and hence is of light construction.

The other walls, and in fact every part of the New Murray, according to the State Factory Inspector, is solidly and well constructed. The Indiana theater laws are very strict, and Mr. Murray in erecting his building had to comply with them. The inspector was here during the course of construction and placed his O. K. on all the work done.

As soon as Mr. Murray secures another sign it will be properly hung. The opening of the theater will take place next Monday as announced.

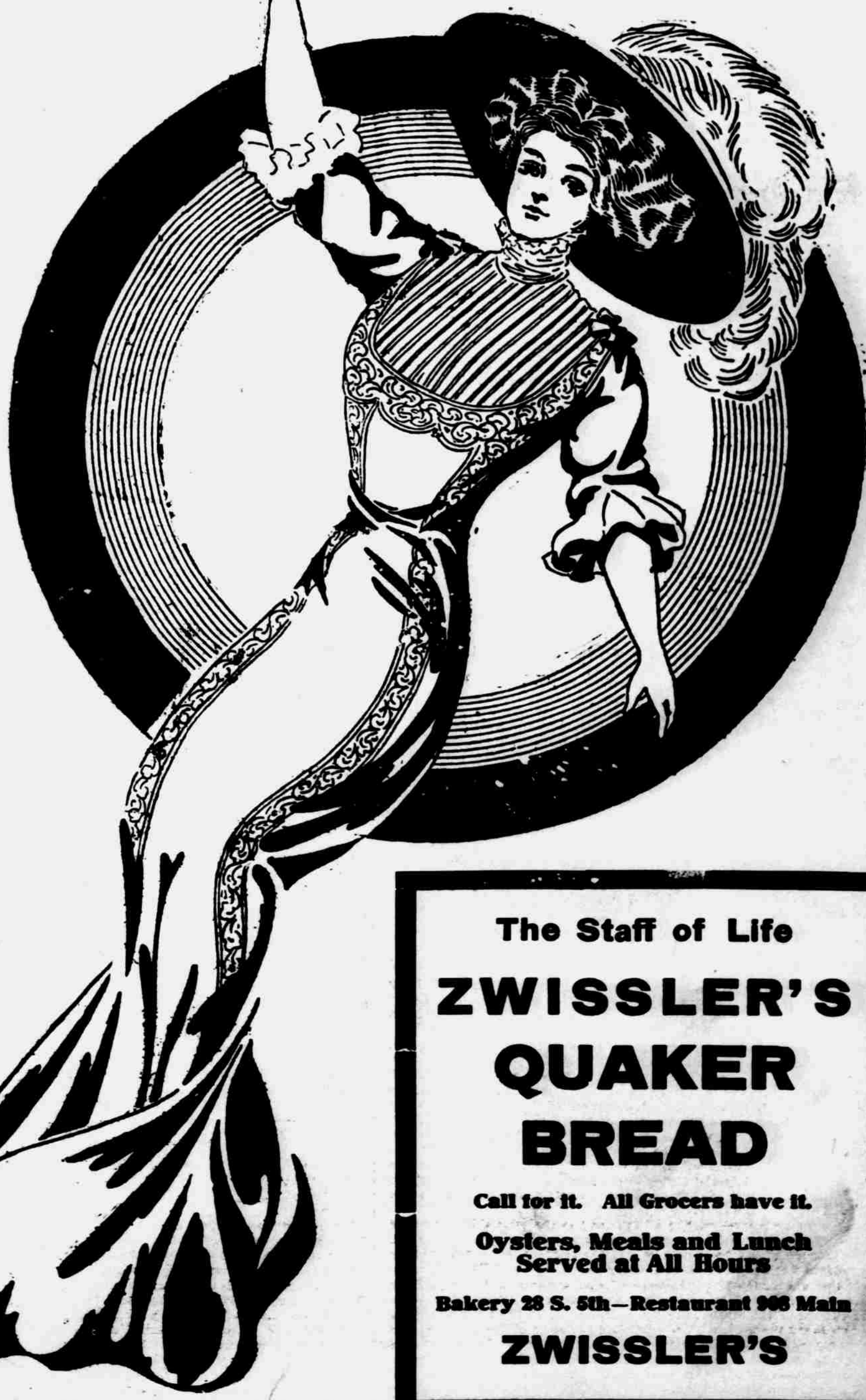

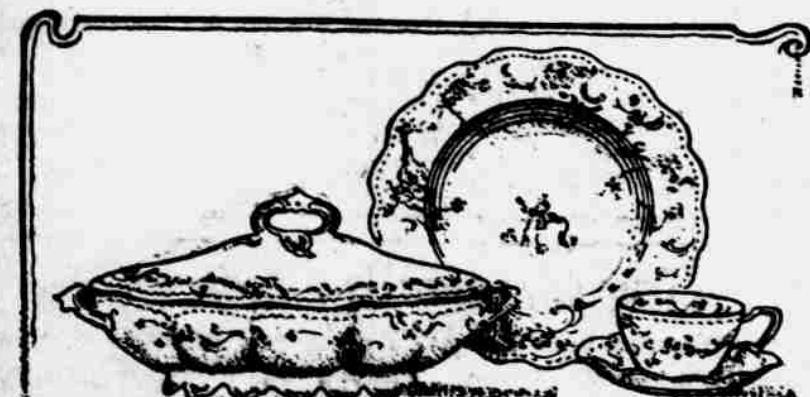
