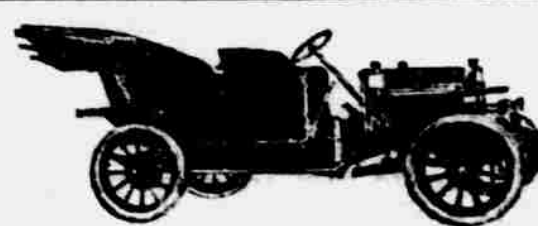

PARIS RILED UP TO GREAT EXTENT

Demonstrations and Riots Follow Execution of Ferrer in Spain.

TROOPS ARE ORDERED OUT

POLICE GUARD THE HOME OF DAUGHTER OF EXECUTED MAN AND SHE IS NOW IN PROSTRATED CONDITION.

(American News Service) Paris, Oct. 14.—Paris today is in a furore over the Ferrer case. Demonstrations and riots that have occurred so far have but added to the seriousness of the situation. The police are taking extraordinary precautions. Troops today guard Ambassador Mundi of Spain, and it is feared that if the radicals are not held firmly in check their first move will be on the ambassadorial residence again.

Senorita Ferrer, daughter of the executed Barcelonian, is in a state of collapse, and it is possible that she may not survive the shock of her father's death. She hoped to the last that her appeal to King Alfonso would have weight. Police guard the house in which she lies, and no gathering is allowed in front of it, although a constant stream of sympathizers passes before it.

Further moves toward a demonstration were made today, but the police will make every effort to prevent a gathering.

It is feared that the rioting of last night is but the precursor of further demonstrations. Not since the Dreyfus case was at its height, has Paris been so wrought up. Troops are ready to march on any crowd that threatens to get beyond the control of the police. Every Spanish official in Paris is protected by a heavy guard.

WILL BE DELEGATES

Miss Eleanora Robinson and Joseph Commons of Centerville, were selected as delegates to the meeting of the state board of Charities and Corrections, to be held at Columbus, Ind., October 23-27, at the meeting of the Wayne county board of charities and corrections. The board considered the matter of the appropriation for an insane ward. Action concurring with the county council in turning down the appropriation was taken.

YOUTHFUL BIGAMIST

(American News Service) Laporte, Ind., Oct. 14.—William J. Murphy, self confessed bigamist, having three wives, was today sentenced to an indeterminate sentence in the state penitentiary. He is only 23 years old.

Steward Plans Employ Only Abstainers on Police Force

Chicago, Oct. 14.—Chicago policemen must get on the water wagon. This is the very latest of a series of reforms inaugurated by Chief of Police Steward. Hereafter policemen addicted to occasional "stews" will not receive the slightest consideration at the hands of the civil service commission trial board. The department is to be purified from one end to the other, the drinkers are to be weeded out as rapidly as possible, and as nearly as possible the police force of Chicago is to be made one of teetotallers. A short time ago the chief issued an order that spirits of ammonia were to be substituted for the small bottles of brandy used in the police ambulances. This was done to remove temptation out of the way of the ambulance men and to reduce the large city liquor bill. Six policemen were discharged by the trial board yesterday afternoon for intoxication. They were William S. Mullen, Thirty-seventh precinct; Herman J. Otten, Fourth precinct; Arthur F. Murray, Twenty-first precinct; James F. O'Keefe, Tenth precinct; Andrew Carroll, Thirty-fifth precinct, and Hoken Mortensen, Twenty-fifth precinct. An official of the civil service commission remarked that the patrolmen were being discharged in greater numbers than he liked to see. Asked if it were being done upon instructions from the chief, he smiled.

State School Superintendent Wants to Find Out Teachers' Ages. Advance Guard of Weary Willies Arrive and Storm the City Building.

WORKING ON PENSION LAW RETREAT FROM COLD WAVE

An opportunity for finding out the exact ages of the teachers of the Wayne county public schools is afforded in the order made on County Superintendent C. W. Jordan, by State Superintendent Robert J. Aley. The order is not received very kindly by the teachers, especially the older women of the fraternity, some of whom would rather quit than divulge this secret, sacred to the fair sex. Of course the married "school marm's" do not care, but there are so few of these in this county that they do not really count. However, the ultimate result of the securing of the ages of the teachers may result favorably to them. Superintendent Aley, who is said was a "tease" of state wide reputation, before his marriage, is not seeking to annoy his subordinates. He has cut out all such antics. Mr. Jordan stated that Mr. Aley was securing data for his proposed teachers' pension law. Besides the ages of the teachers, Mr. Aley desires also to find out how long each teacher has been in the service, and also the number of those who quit this year, and the length of time they served in educational work.

MADE FINE FLIGHT

(American News Service) Rome, Oct. 1.—Followed by an enthusiastic crowd in autos and on bicycles, the military dirigible balloon sailed over Rome today at the end of its trip from Bracciano. It descended gracefully at the Piazza d'Armi and twelve minutes later amid the cheers of the crowds, started off again for Bracciano. Thousands followed the dirigible in the city from Monte Mario to the Castello de Sant Angelo.

HONOR FOR M'EWEN
