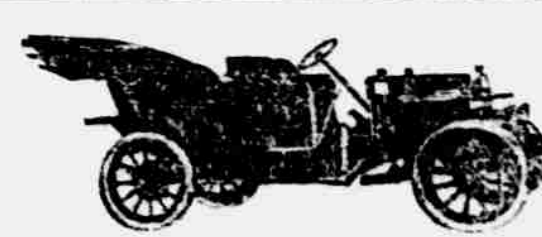

RECORD IS CLAIMED

San Antonio, Texas, October 16.—According to the data of his balloon flight made on July 4 and 5, 1908, Dr. Frederick J. Fielding of this city still claims that he holds the distance record of aerial navigation by means of the gas bag. The St. Louis winner in the recent contest only covered 580 miles, while the Fielding-San Antonio balloon traveled 795 miles. What is more, Dr. Fielding remained in the air but twenty-three hours and fifteen minutes to cover this distance, while forty hours was the time of the St. Louis winner.

Dr. Fielding does as yet not know whether his record is officially considered as having been broken. Should this be the case he will issue a challenge for a new contest, to be started from this city. His flight of a year ago was made under the auspices of the federation clubs of Chicago and was rewarded with the Bryan J. Arnold cup. He is inclined to think that this is the reason why the association holding the St. Louis contest is now claiming the record.

When French and Spaniards Failed to Take Charleston

Graphic Account Found in an Old London Publication of the Attack Upon South Carolina in 1706, and the Utter Defeat of the Enemy.

Charleston, S. C., Oct. 16.—In an old file of the London Political Mercury, dating from 1688 to 1724, appears an interesting account of the attack by French and Spaniards on this place in 1706. The story is entitled "A full and particular account of the attack by French and Spaniards upon South Carolina, with the disappointment and disgrace they met with," and reads:

"Charlestown in South Carolina, September 12th, 1706.—On Saturday, August 24, One Captain Stoolie, a New York Privateer, came in the Afternoon to an Anchor before this Place, from whence he was lately sailed to Cruise off to St. Augustine, and reported, That he had met with Six Vessels coming out of that Harbour, which so we have been informed since, were fitted out at St. Augustine, in order to attack this town.

They Chased the New York Privateer and one of them, mounted with Six Guns, and Four Patterones, commanded by one Lewis Pasquereau, engaged Captain Stoolie, and after having lost only one Man and two or three wounded, was brought upon the Carrack forwards the Evening.

The Privateer had scarce made an End to this Report when he saw four Smoaks at Solivan's Island, the usual Signal that Ships are in Sight, whereupon Captain Cook was immediately ordered thither to observe what the were. In the Light he came back and reported that Five of the Ships aforesaid were to the Southward close to the Shoar, upon which the Alarm was fired for the Country People to come down to the Town.

The 25th in the morning the Pilot was again sent to the Island aforesaid, and observed the Enemy in the same Station and that they were sending some small Craft upon the South Bar to sound it.

The 26th the Pilot was again sent to the Island from whence he observed the ships in the same place, but discovered Two large Periaugers full of Men coming around Commings's Point, which were afterward observed to go into the Sound between Folly Island and James's Island.

The 27th in the Morning to the Surprise of our ignorant Pilots and all the People, who thought it impossible, all the Ships came in by the South Bar and came to an Anchor toward the Evening; but the weather proving uncertain, they drew within Solivan's Island, about Five Miles distant from hence, and we did not then question, but they would come the next Day before this Place

In his Return, and about 10 of the Clock he came ashore and gave the Governour an Account of that Action.

About Midnight his Honour received Advice from the Neck, where Mr. Barksdale lives, that the Enemies were still plundering upon Colleton Dearsley's Creek; whereupon Colonel Rhet was ordered to send thither 100 Men in one of the Gallies and some other small Craft.

Captain Cante and Captain Fenwick with their Companies, were commanded for that Service and about two in the Morning they put from Town and coming to Abeauw at break of Day, they marched to Colleton Rearsley's Creek and at 8 (the 30th) they met the Enemy at Hattman's Plantation, on the other side. They exchanged two or three volleys, killed 10 or 17, wounded several, put the rest to flight, and took 33 Prisoners, one of them a Lieutenant who commanded the Party, whom they brought ashore. We lost on our side but one Man.

A Party of our Indians pursued the Enemy and killed and took several of them. Some got to Mr. Barksdale's and with small Canoes saved themselves on Board their Ships, leaving their Arms behind them. Many came and surrendered, so that before Night we had 58 Prisoners and it was computed we had killed between thirty and forty.

Now I must tell you at the sight of the Enemies coming in at the South Bar, we were in great Consternation and expected they would have been the same Tide, before the Town, but the sight of our Fortifications brought them to an Anchor.

We had then in the Harbour a Ship from Biddford able to carry 16 Guns, Captain Spread's Ship of 16 Guns, the Mermaid Galley 12 Guns, the New York Privateer Sloop, 10 Guns, Captain Kembee's Ship and Captain Saitus' Sloop but no Guns. All these Ships and Sloops were unrigged, but finding the Enemy stood still within the Island, the Governour called a Council of War of the Captains of the Ships wherein it was resolved to fit them out with all Expedition and that Captain Kembee's Ship should be fitted into a Fireship. After a brief engagement we drove the enemy away."
