CZAR IS IN ITALY

He Was Received Today at Racogni With the Greatest Pomp.

MANY TROOPS GUARD HIM

Racogni, Italy, Oct. 23.—Czar Nicholas of Russia, arrived here today to the booming of guns and a military display seldom equaled in modern times on similar occasions. An army was drawn up to salute him, and for miles the royal train passed between unbroken lines of troops. Fifty thousand men guarded the ruler of the Russians. The meeting of the czar and Italy's king is one of the most important events of its kind that has occurred in years. Its object is to plan to curb the Austrians in the Balkans.

Although there was a touch of simplicity about the actual greeting between the czar and King Victor Emmanuel, the two monarchs were surrounded by the courts and the surrounding country resembled a scene before a battle, so thick were the troops.

Little chance was left for a demonstration against the czar. All suspects who might lead to any manifestation had been arrested and every possible precaution was taken to prevent either a show of disapproval or a more serious attempt.

IS VERY ODD CASE

Prosecutor Ladd Has Three Umbrellas Pilfered by Daring Pilferers.

POLICE ARE SUSPECTED

The deepest mystery surrounds the disappearance of prosecuting attorney Charles Ladd's brand new umbrella at the court house this morning. When Mr. Ladd announced that he had lost the third new umbrella within the past week, practically all of the court house attaches went on a still hunt for the missing article and a diligent search of the building was at once instituted. But their efforts proved of no avail and the prosecutor was forced to brave the elements without his rain protector.

Mr. Ladd asserts that one of his good umbrellas was stolen from him at police headquarters while he blames officials at the court house for the loss of the other two. The police are baffled at the mystery but by their untiring efforts hope to unravel the problem before long. In a huffy manner which bordered on peevishness Mr. Ladd declared that he was going to put a chain and padlock on the next umbrella he purchased.

STRIKES AT TRUST

Indianapolis, Oct. 23.—Governor Marshall today instructed Warden Reid of Michigan City prison, to start an investigation of the advisability of starting prison manufacture of certain kinds of farm machinery. The governor says since the Harvester Trust is fighting prison-made binder twine, he favors the state going into further competition with the trust. This would be an entirely new industry for the prison.

OPPOSE THE BUDGET

London, Oct. 23.—Significant figures showing the attitude of the public toward the proposed budget were issued today. Against the budget, 395 petitions containing 164,000 signatures have been presented to parliament. Demands for alterations in the budget embraced in 91 petitions, with 3,161 signatures, and but one petition, bearing a single signature, advocated its passage.

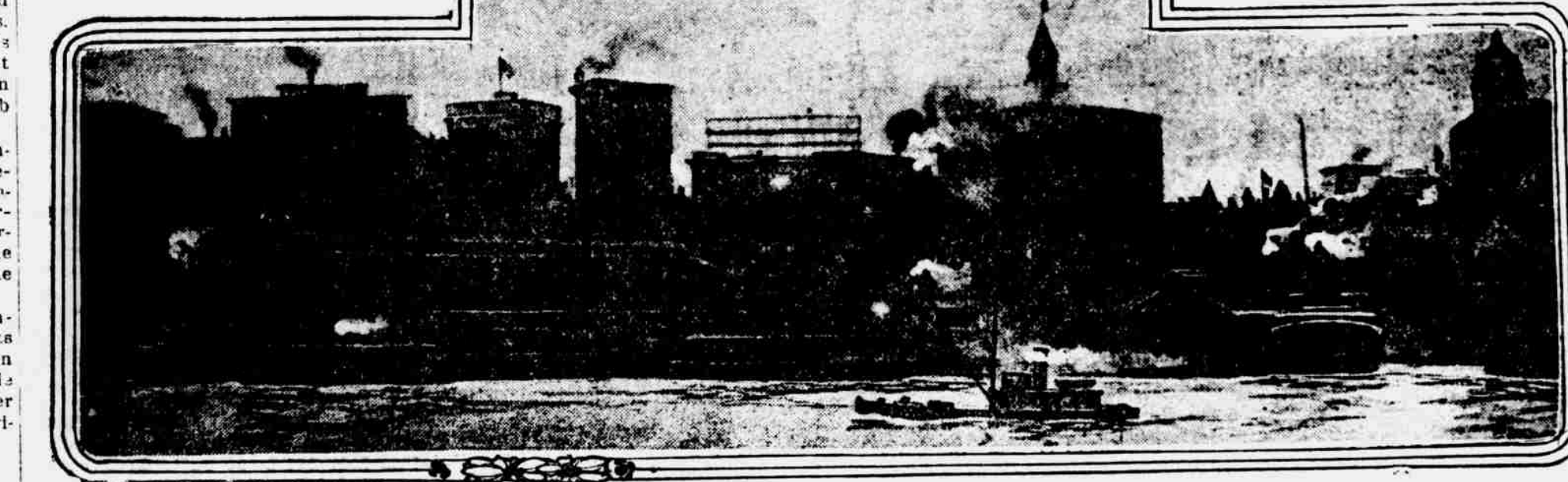
WOUNDED KILLED BY SAVAGE MOORS

Every Wounded Tribesman Put to Death to Escape The Spanish.

SPANISH ARE SUFFERING

WOUNDED DONS NOT PROPERLY CARED FOR NOTWITHSTANDING THE FACT THAT HOSPITALS ARE MUCH IMPROVED.

Melilla, Oct. 23.—Prisoners captured by Gen. Marina's forces today reported that the Moors are killing their own wounded to prevent them falling into the hands of the Spanish enemy.



The losses to the army of tribesmen have already passed the 4,000 mark in killed alone.

In spite of constant repulses, the Moors remain firmly in their stronghold in the hills about Melilla. Their ranks have been as much depleted in sorties as in pitched battles and the slaughter of their wounded is believed to have added material to the death list caused by the Spaniards.

After each attack the retreating natives scurry back to the hills. But the rear guard never fails to fulfill its duty of putting the fallen tribesmen out of their misery.

Can't Prevent Practice.
The Spanish are unable to prevent the practice, although wherever possible they rescue their injured enemies. Many troopers have made heroic dashes to save injured Moors from their companions.

There is much suffering among the Spanish injured, but the hospital facilities have been greatly improved. The injured who are hopelessly incapacitated are returned to Spain.

The Red Cross nursing corps was increased today by the arrival of the Marquesa Del Merito, one of the most beautiful women in Spain. For some time she has been in England directing the education of her two children, and a few months ago was presented at the British court. When it became known, however, that the hospitals here were in need of recruits for nursing, the Marquesa abandoned her personal affairs and hurried to Melilla.

FAUL IS IMPROVING

James Faul, the young boy who was severely injured by falling off of a C. & L. freight train yesterday afternoon, is reported today as getting along nicely. He was removed from the hospital last night to the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Paul, on North Seventh street. The youth was not so badly injured as was at first supposed. It was thought at the time that his hip had been fractured, but an investigation proved that it was only severely bruised. No bones were broken but young Paul received many cuts and bruises over various portions of his body.

DAMAGE BY METEOR

PAUL IS MISSING ALSO THE CHECKS OF THE LABORERS

Austrian Keeper of Railroad Boarding House Gets Possession of Checks to Be Cash—Is Missing Now.

FOREIGNERS WROUGHT TO A FRENZIED STATE

Paul Sutavita Came to Richmond Yesterday Morning, Secured a Roll and Is Now In the "Clear."

Where is Paul Sutavita, an Austrian who conducts a boarding house about three miles west of Centerville, and where is the \$600 which he cashed in checks given to him by the foreigners who board at his place and who are employed by a contracting firm to do work for the Pennsylvania railroad?

The mysterious disappearance of the man has caused great indignation and excitement in the camp of Hunyaks at Hiser's Station. On Thursday night the men were paid off for the past month and presented their checks to Sutavita for him to cash, as had been the custom among many of the foreigners for some time. Sutavita, with his wife and two children, keeps a boarding house and has about twenty boarders, all of them being Hunyaks. Heretofore he has always cashed the checks for the laborers and returned the money immediately.

Came to Richmond.
Yesterday morning Sutavita came to Richmond with a number of checks belonging to the men. Nothing has been seen of him since that time and there is great uneasiness in the camp. An investigation was immediately made this morning, which disclosed the fact that Sutavita had cashed four of the largest checks at the First National bank in this city yesterday morning. Joseph Mitchell, a brother-in-law of the missing man, had given Sutavita his check for \$140, and about ten other foreigners had given him their checks for smaller amounts, making the total something over \$600.

Whether the man has met with foul play or is dishonest, is a matter of conjecture. It is said that he owes large meat and grocery bills in Centerville, and has been considerably worried for some time because he was unable to pay them. Sutavita had never been entrusted with so much money at any one time before, and it is the general opinion that he has "gone south" with it for the benefit of his health, perhaps. Mitchell, the heaviest loser, is very indignant over his loss. He declared that if ever he sees Sutavita he will kill him like a dog.

Wife Is Hysterical.
Sutavita's wife at Hiser's station is almost hysterical over her husband's strange disappearance and is certain that he must have been murdered. She denounces the theory that it was his intention to be dishonest, but the Hunyaks who are deploring the loss of their month's wages, are of a different opinion, in view of the circumstances which surround the case.

The matter was reported to the police this morning, and every effort to locate the missing man is being made. Sutavita is described as being about 40 years old, tall and slender, with black hair, dark complexion and a black pointed moustache. Work has been practically suspended at Hiser's station. Searching parties have been instituted and the police in the surrounding towns and cities have been asked to assist in the man hunt.

Challenges to Duels.
Among the incidents in the aftermath of the ministerial crisis, the challenge to duels made by Senor Ortega and Deputy Soriano to the former minister of the Interior, Senor De La Cierva, today attracted much attention. De La Cierva is also the defendant in several libel actions brought by journalists.

Senor Ortega's prosecution was demanded a short time ago by the captain-general of Catalonia, who accused him of leading an attempt to burn a Jesuit college in Barcelona at the time of the riots last July. He is one of the republican leaders.

While the new ministry today took up its work actively, the opposition is already beginning to form a solid front against the radicals.

One of the first announcements of Senor Moret was that the new cabinet would carry out the unfulfilled promise of the preceding ministry to give the details of the Ferrer trial full publicity.

ROWE WAS ARRESTED

Charged With Committing Assault and Battery Yesterday.

CAUSE FAMILY TROUBLES

James Rowe, colored, was arrested yesterday afternoon for assault and battery on James Smith also colored, on North Third and D streets. The altercation between the two men grew out of a dispute over family matters. It was alleged that Rowe's children trespassed on the property of Smith and when asked by Smith to keep away it incited the wrath of Rowe. After calling each other many pet names, punctuated with sizzling adjectives, Rowe threw a block at Smith which struck him in the head causing an ugly scalp wound. Rowe was fined \$5 and costs in the city court this afternoon.

VANDUSER ARRESTED

CELEBRATION IS TO END TONIGHT

San Francisco, Oct. 23.—At midnight the grand old Spanish soldado and adventurer, Don Gaspar De Portola, will disappear from his realm of a week as splendidly as he entered upon the conquest of new San Francisco aboard his caraval. But he has summoned the Genil, Mirth and Frivolity, from the caves of happiness and has commanded them to kill care.

Tonight is to be a fairy story in real life. It is the last request of Don Gaspar and his consort that their thousands of joy-loving followers forsake conventional garb and clothe themselves in the hundred and one fantastic costumes of carnival.

Leaves in an Airship.
At midnight the Queen will be wrapped in a silver starred black cloak of night that possesses the power of invisibility. Don Gaspar will step into an airship and, after sailing over the city, will disappear from sight of the host of merry revelers on the streets.

The morning and afternoon programs of the final day of the celebration are given over almost entirely to athletic sports. Standing out alone in point of importance, is of course, the world's champion automobile races in Alameda county, which includes events at 300 and 250 miles. Then there is a golf tournament, tennis finals, association football and international boat races.
