IS NOW MARCHING
THROUGH GEORGIA

President Taft Given Royal Welcome on Arrival at Macon Today.

IS GREETED BY GOVERNOR

HE ADDRESSED LARGE CROWDS AT THE FAIR GROUNDS AND LATE THIS AFTERNOON HE WILL LEAVE FOR SAVANNAH.

Macon, Ga., Nov. 4.—Live possums and persimmons formed a part of the elaborate decorations in honor of President Taft who emerged from his private sleep in a car at eight-thirty o'clock this morning feeling fine and dandy and much delighted with continued southern enthusiasm which greeted him here. He addressed crowds at the fair grounds and will leave for Savannah late in the day.

Had Brilliant Staff.

Governor Brown met President Taft at the station and extended the states

greeting to him. The governor was accompanied by his staff, brilliant in the bright sunshine with their uniforms.

The governor escorted President Taft to the home of Congressman Charles L. Bartlett on College street. There breakfast was served shortly after eight o'clock. The streets through which the party passed in carriages were beautifully decorated and throngs cheered for the president.

President Taft will soon visit the Panama canal on a tour of inspection. He will embark from Mobile, according to the authentic information received here today.

Miles and Knots.
The United States naval hydrographic office publishes the following information regarding the nautical mile and the statute mile: In the United States the sea or nautical mile or knot, used for the measurement of distances in ocean navigation, has a length of 6,080.27 feet; in France, Germany and Austria the nautical or sea mile has a length of 6,076.23 feet; in England the nautical mile, corresponding to the admiralty knot, is 6,080 feet. The geographic mile, which is the length of one minute of longitude of the equator of the terrestrial spheroid, is 6,087.15 feet long. The statute mile, used principally in measurements on land, is 5,280 feet.
