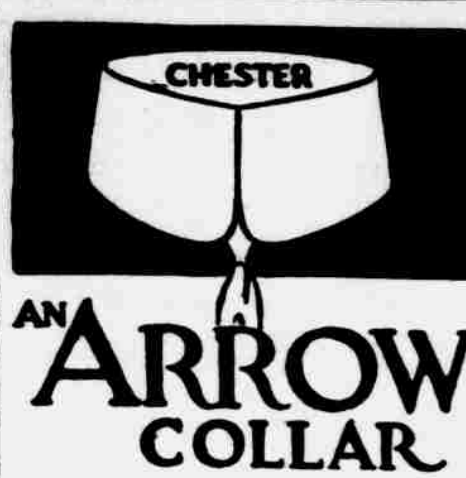

HAD MADE LONG TRIP

Travels of Letter for Local Person Occupied Six Weeks' Time.

SAMPLE OF CARELESSNESS

Although but about twenty-six miles from this city, a letter mailed at New Madison, Ohio, October 9, to a local address, was delivered here yesterday morning. The letter was a valuable one, and undoubtedly, if it could speak, it would give a very interesting account of its travels during the past month.

The letter passed through the dead letter office at Washington, D. C., because the sender had failed to put the name of the addressee on the envelope, and, as no one here had authority to deliver the letter to the address given, or to open it to find out for whom it was intended, the letter had to be sent to Washington.

The letter was so important that tracers were sent out for it by the New Madison postal officials. Postmaster J. A. Spekenhiser stated that undoubtedly, the mail service received all kinds of blame for not delivering the letter. The letter is only an example of the carelessness which many people exercise when addressing an envelope. Another similar example was a letter received by Mr. Spekenhiser early in the week in which it was requested that all mail received at this office for a certain party be sent to Huntsville, Ala., but the letter was unsigned and consequently the office force could not follow out the instructions.
