vote of the council, shall go into effect before ten days from the time of its final passage; and if during said ten days a petition signed by electors of the city equal in number to at least twenty-five percentum of the entire vote cast for all candidates for mayor at the past preceding general municipal election at which a mayor was elected, protesting against the passage of such ordinance, be presented to the council, the same shall thereupon be suspended from going into operation, and it shall be the duty of the council to reconsider such ordinance; and if the same is not entirely repealed, the council shall submit the ordinance, as is provided by sub-section b of section 19 of this act, to the vote of the electors of the city, either at the general election or at a special municipal election to be called for that purpose; and such ordinance shall not go into effect, or become operative unless a majority of the qualified electors voting on the same, shall vote in favor thereof. Said petition shall be in all respects in accordance with the provisions of said section 19, except as to the percentage of signers, and be examined and certified to by the clerk in all respects as therein provided."

"Under this section ten days are given to the citizens within which to determine whether or not it is advisable to demand a referendum vote upon the ordinance in question. Thus obnoxious measures may be defeated by the people themselves. This we consider an extremely important condition, calculated to prevent bad government. The conditions imposed are so conservative as to prevent recourse there-to except in flagrant cases. The petition for the referendum must be signed by 25 per cent of the voters as shown by the last preceding election for mayor."

Safeguards of the People.

"Another important innovation, already referred to, is that provided in Section 19 of the Act for the initiative, whereby important legislation sustained by public opinion, evidenced by a petition of 25 per cent of the voters, must be taken up and considered by the council. In the event of favorable action by the council the measure so adopted shall become valid ordinances. In the event of their rejection they must be submitted to popular vote at either special or general elections. The initiative may also be exercised at a general election upon the application of ten per cent of the voters, this distinction being made for the manifest reason that a special election would prove expensive and the general election would not involve any great additional expense."

Majority Government.

"It will be observed by students of municipal government that by the law in question, the state of Iowa has practically restored the old New England town meeting system, adapted to new conditions that have developed since the town meeting system was inaugurated. The five councilmen are in effect, selectmen, elected by the entire electorate of the city at an election instead of at a public meeting, at which it would be manifestly impossible to secure deliberative action from a large constituency. The referendum and initiative practically cover the entire field of municipal action and involve the exercise of municipal power by the people, who are immediately concerned thereby by instructing the councilmen or selectmen regarding their will. If the measure fails it will involve a failure of democratic government."

POPULAR DIPLOMAT

London Regrets to Lose Newly Appointed U. S. Minister to Roumania.

MADE A SPLENDID RECORD

London, Nov. 13.—Mr. Ridgely Carter, councillor of the American Embassy, who is leaving England to take up his new post as American Minister at Bucharest will be more missed than any former American diplomat. His manners are perfect, and he has been known to tackle whole brigades of ladies, who storm the embassy offices in Victoria street in the hope of being presented at the court, and to send them all away one by one in a perfectly peaceful frame of mind. His usual method was to tell a disappointed one how sad it was that the king's list was filled up and that Mrs. Somebody or other (an American of enormous importance) was unable to get an invitation to one of the courts. This, invariably, had the desired effect and Mr. Carter's good looks completed each conquest.

Mrs. Carter, although a charming

and very cultured woman, has never shared her husband's great popularity. She is very shy and does not make friends easily, but she has formed an intimate circle of friends in London, who are interested in literature and who will miss her considerably.

The young members of the Bachelors' Club will miss Miss Mildred Carter who was certainly the most attractive of all the American debutantes of last season. Even at this eleventh hour it is rumored that Miss Carter will not go to Bucharest. It is well known that two very eligible young men have paid her marked attention, but Miss Carter is a girl of remarkable strength of character, and, moreover, she is devoted to her father. Mr. William Phillips will find it hard to fill Mr. Carter's place, but as the fiancée of Miss Ethel Roosevelt, he will be an important personage so far as the American Colony is concerned.

Might Help Some.

In Shakespearean days they used to label the scenery. They hung out placards stating that "This is a Wood" or "This is a Castle." We don't need to do that now.

Still, we might use the scheme to advantage. It would help sometimes to see an alleged Thespian bearing the legend, "This is an Actor."—Louisville Courier-Journal.

Tuberculosis Being Wiped Out

New York, Nov. 13.—During the year that has passed since the International Congress on Tuberculosis met at Washington, one institution or organization for the treatment or prevention of tuberculosis has been established every day. Sundays and holidays, included, according to a bulletin of the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis, fifteen new beds in hospitals or sanatoria have been provided also for every day of the year.

A year ago the rate of increase was one organization or institution every other day, only one half as fast as now. Less than a year ago there were 40 consumptives for every hospital bed provided. Today the number has been reduced to 30. Nearly 20,000 beds are now provided in institutions for the treatment of consumption, an increase of over 5,000. The number of special tuberculosis dispensaries in the United States has more than doubled the number of anti-tuberculosis associations has increased 68 per cent, and the number of hospitals and sanatoria 43 per cent.

In one branch of anti-tuberculosis work, particularly emphasized by the International Congress, a signal advance has been made, that is, in the provision of hospital accommodations for advanced cases. In all parts of

the country, state and municipal authorities have been urged to provide hospitals for dangerous cases of tuberculosis, with the result that over 1,000 beds have been established in the past year. At the present time there are, however, only 6,000 beds, and 75,000 advanced cases which ought to be in hospitals. Fully 75,000 others could be treated at home, but it would be safer for the community to segregate them in institutions. Every advanced case of tuberculosis is a center from which the disease spreads, and unless the patient is taught how to be careful in his habits, and unless he has the proper home surroundings, he should be in a hospital, where he will not be a menace to others.

The National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis declares that at least 70,000 more beds in hospitals are needed for advanced cases of consumption. Until these are provided, tuberculosis cannot be wiped out. If everybody in the United States gave \$5 to provide hospitals for the dangerous consumptives, sufficient funds would be procured to destroy forever the threat of tuberculosis from this country.

London, Nov. 13.—Professional bridesmaids may now be hired in London. They are to be had at one of the great department stores, whose motto is "Everything" and where "extra guests" and "dancing men" of distinguished appearance are obtainable by social climbers.

This new department is intended for runaway brides and others, who need feminine support at the ceremony, but don't want to call upon their girl friends. The bridesmaids are selected from the prettiest girls behind the counter, or stenographers of the firm. As there is no very great demand for bridesmaids as a commercial proposition, the store does not maintain a special staff of girls for this purpose.

and remain on file with the city clerk for public inspection at least one week before the final passage or adoption thereof. No franchise or right to occupy or use the streets, highways, bridges or public places in any city shall be granted, renewed or extended, except by ordinance, and every franchise or grant for interurban or street railways, gas or water works, electric light or power plants, heating plants, telegraph or telephone systems, or other public service utilities, within said city, must be authorized or approved by a majority of the electors, voting thereon at a general or special election, as provided in Section 776 of the Code.

"In order to render assurance doubly sure, it is provided, in Section 20, that

"No ordinance passed by the council, except when otherwise required by the general laws of the state or by the provisions of this act, except an ordinance for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health or safety, which contains a statement of its urgency and is passed by a two-thirds
