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A CONFESSION BY RAY LAMPHERE IS ANNOUNCED TODAY

A St. Louis Paper Alleges to Have Secured Substance of Dying Statements of Laporte Murderer.

MRS. GUNNESS WAS A VICTIM OF THE BLAZE

He Says "Murder Farm" Mistress Was Burned to Death After He Chloroformed Her To Rob the House.

St. Louis, Jan. 13.—The Post Dispatch today prints a story that Ray Lamphere, who died a few days ago in the Indiana penitentiary, at Michigan City, while serving time for setting fire to the home of Mrs. Belle Gunness, did not carry the secret of the Gunness choral farm to his grave. When he believed death was near, he unburdened himself by a confession, clearing up the mystery. A Post Dispatch correspondent visited six states and learned the details of the confession, heretofore supposed to have been made known only to the Reverend Schell, formerly pastor of a church at Laporte and held by the latter as a confidential secret. The confession shows that Mrs. Gunness is dead, that she and her three children were chloroformed by Lamphere, who was robbing the house and all four were burned to death; that Jennie Olson was not murdered by Mrs. Gunness, but was chloroformed and burned to death like the rest; that Lamphere had a woman accomplice in his robbery venture; that the chloroform used was a part of a large quantity he had formerly bought for Mrs. Gunness to kill three other men.

Lamphere saw one of these men killed and assisted in burying all three. They were Andrew Hegelein, Ole Budborg, and Tommes Peterson Lien, the latter being the third husband of Mrs. Gunness. Rev. Schell, who is now at Adair, Iowa, has persisted in refusing to make public Lamphere's confession, but what the Post Dispatch says above is a story he would have to verify if it was at liberty to break silence on the subject.

Rehearsals have begun for the "Messiah," which will be given by the Earlham Oratorio Society under the direction of Prof. C. K. Chase and Miss Lucy Francisco. The Christmas concert given by the Society was an entire success and the chorus work on the "Messiah" is beginning with excellent prospects. The chorus is composed of nearly one hundred voices, and arrangements have already been made to secure soloists from other cities. The date of the recital has not been definitely announced, but it will probably be some time in April.

Mrs. Cora Schaefer of Indianapolis, formerly of this city was arrested by the Indianapolis police last evening and charged with the neglect of her two children, Lloyd, aged 8 years, and Minnie, aged 4 years. The two little children had been left in their bed at their mother's home on East Market street while the mother went to a public dance. The children became cold and not having had any supper were suffering greatly when found.

Mrs. Schaefer and her husband became estranged as a result of attentions shown her by a local man. The husband was formerly a waiter in a local restaurant but, it is understood, he is at South Bend at present.

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
