AMERICA SCORED FOR ITS ACTION

Former President of Nicaragua Charges Trickery Was Employed.

TRUCE CAUSED A DEFEAT

ZELAYA DECLARES WASHINGTON OFFICIALS WANT INSURGENTS TO WIN CIVIL WAR—ATTEMPT ON CALDERA.

Mexico City, Feb. 1.—In a statement given to a personal friend for publication after his departure from this city, Jose Santos Zelaya, former president of Nicaragua, who left last night en route to Belgium, declared he was tricked by the United States into providing the revolutionists an advantage during the early stages of the insurrection in his country.

"Our army had defeated the revolutionists on the San Juan river and was marching on Bluefields," says the statement. "The revolt would have ended in a week, when suddenly the United States asked us to declare a truce while terms of peace could be discussed. The truce was declared, and before operations were resumed the insurgents received a large ship-

ment of arms and ammunition from the United States.

Says Nicaragua Was Tricked.

"After that followed the battle of Rama, in which the government army was defeated. We were tricked and played like figures in a game of chess by the powerful influence at Washington until the advantage was given over to the other side, just as Washington had planned.

"The American government is still determined that the insurgents shall win, but its pretense of neutrality while arms and men come down on every boat from the United States prevents it from making an open avowal and saving the sacrifice of thousands of innocent lives."

Denies Charges of Knox.

Zelaya made a special specific denial of each of the charges made by Secretary Knox in his letter of dismissal to Charge d'Affaires Rodriguez, and continued:

"Several Central American countries, notably Guatemala and Salvador, appealed to Washington against my government, and Washington consented to lend itself as a tool to Estrada Cabrera to work my downfall, for no other reason than that I opposed the desire of Cabrera to become the ruling figure of all Central America."

Bluff Saves Caldera's Life.

Managua, Nicaragua, Feb. 1.—American Vice Consul Henry Caldera asserts the opinion that he escaped assassination at the principal hotel here last night by his quick motion to draw a gun.

The man, who Caldera thinks had a knife up his sleeve, asked "Are you Caldera?"

Caldera, who was suspicious, replied, "No, I am not Caldera. What do you want with him?" The man replied, "I want to get him," or words to the same effect, in Spanish.

Caldera made a motion as if to draw a gun and, although he had no weapon, the man exclaimed, "O, you have a revolver."

The man fled. Caldera believes the natives are against him because he was born in Nicaragua and is a naturalized American.

The Princeton is patrolling the Fonseca coast. Madrid estimates that the war is costing \$7,000 in gold daily for the government and \$2,000 in gold for the revolutionists. Troops are moving and the government again anticipates attacking the revolutionists.
