OLD FAVORITES PLAYING

ADO MANSFIELD'S BROCKTON
TEAM HAS HAD HARD LUCK
AND IS LAST—CUNNINGHAM,
JR., IS A GREAT STAR.

The National Polo League season will close within a few weeks after a most successful season. The majority of the players in the league are those who played on Western league teams when polo had its palmy days in this state.

The league teams, line up and percentage, according to the last reports, are as follows:

"Cunny, Jr." is whirlwind.
The most sensational spurt made by any team in the league was that by the Pawtucket aggregation on which Cunningham, Jr., is playing center. The club won fifteen straight games which placed it within six points of first place.

Ado Mansfield, the Richmond boy, is captain of the Brockton club. This club has had more bad luck than any other team in the league, players being injured frequently and the team also handicapped by not having one or two positions filled with strong players.

Two Local Favorites.
George Bone and George Cunningham, Sr., Richmond's pennant winning rushers, are not playing regularly with Waterbury. The two control the franchise and take turns in playing with Taylor, the Anderson rusher. Both are the favorites of the league. Doherty is playing with this pair and is living up to his reputation.

Jimmy Cameron, manager and half back of the Pawtucket team, played the last four weeks with his right leg in a cast.

The premier rusher of the league is Duggan of New Bedford, having secured 829 at time of publication of last official standing. Other well known rushers and their records, include: Higgins, 469; Lewis, 435; Taylor, 423; Quigley, 413; Hart, 308; Cunningham, Jr., 281; Mercer, 245; Cunningham Sr., 67; Bone, 18; Thompson, 17; Harkins, 12; and Pierce, 8.

Best Goal Getters.
The leading goal getters are: Hart, 228; Williams, 200; Harkins, 246; Lincoln, 234; Taylor, 228; Mercer, 219; Duggan, 216; Lewis, 214; Higgins, 213; Quigley, 165; Thompson, 156; Bone, 148; McGilvary, 134; Jean, 124; Lyons, 67; Cunningham, Jr., 57; Cunningham, Sr., 47; Mansfield, 78.

Hardy is the champion foul maker, with 45 to his credit. Others who are prominent in this way include: Miller, 36; Holderness, 35; Jean, 34; Farrell, 20; Cunningham, Jr., 18; Hart and Cameron, 16; Mansfield, 15; Lewis and Bone, each 5; Quigley, 4; Thompson, 3.

The goal tenders are led by Bannan with an average of .917. Averages of others include: Harper, .905; Malory, .890; Mullen, .888; Mullen, .882; Cusick, .880. Bannan has had more stops than any other goal tender.

PLANT WILL EXPAND

Wayne Works Is Considering
the Erection of a New
Foundry Building.

PLANS NOT YET PREPARED

The management of the Wayne Works have under consideration the advisability of increasing the moulding department one hundred percent, and while the plans and specifications for the foundry have not been completed, it is almost certain that work on the addition will be commenced within the next three months.

Just where the foundry will be located, its size and other details of this nature, are not definitely known, nor will they be until the plans and specifications are completed. It is probable that the addition will extend from the present department to the east and south, and take in a considerable portion of what now is used as a lumber yard.

The company has closed a contract with a large automobile concern, for supplying the cylinders to be used next year and the addition is essential in event the local company carries out its contract. The capacity of the present department is severely tested, with the work now ahead. About one hundred moulders are employed.

OPPOSE TARIFF WAR

Gaar, Scott & Company Hopes
U. S. and Canada Will Re-
main at "Peace."

WHAT RESULTS WOULD BE

The imposition of the maximum tariff rates upon Canadian imports by the United States government is being vigorously opposed by the Gaar, Scott Threshing Machine company of this city. Officials of the company declare that if the United States raises the duty, the rate will be as high as to compel the company to establish a branch factory in Canada or jeopardize several thousand dollars worth of business. It is said that if the maximum tariff rate is imposed by the United States on Canada, the latter country will retaliate in such a way as to practically ruin American trade with that country. The manufacturers of the country, it is said, are very much incensed over the proposed action of the government and are doing everything in their power to prevent the step from being taken.

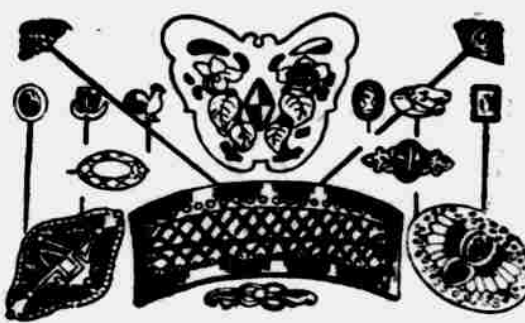
