## MISSING LETTERS LOCATED IN BOX

Ballinger-Pinchot Committee Investigating Recent Discovery

IN A MYSTERIOUS MANNER

THE PERSONAL EFFECTS OF R. L. GLAVIS, RANGING FROM MANICURE SCISSORS TO TOBACCO POUCH, ARE FOUND.

(Palladium Special)  
Washington, April 9.—The Ballinger-Pinchot joint investigations committee opened a session this morning with the members standing around a mysterious dry goods box in which, it is alleged, twenty-four missing Bowman letters were found by Andrew Christenson, Glavis's successor as Chief of the Field Division of the General Land office, at Seattle.

The box was brought here from Seattle some weeks ago, and deposited in the committee's private office. Christenson examined the box this morning, exhibiting its contents while the committee looked on with interest. Glavis was not present. It contained Glavis's personal effects, ranging from a sleeping bag to manicure scissors and including photographs and tobacco pouch. Christenson explained the manner in which he found the alleged missing papers. When the committee adjourned to the main room Alfred H. Brooks, geologist in the United States geological survey, was recalled. He gave some interesting data regarding the world's coal supply. He estimated the coal area at 509,000 square miles of which only four-tenths of one per cent had been used. England's supply is 12,000 square miles he said, of which less than four-tenths of one per cent has been used.
