Across Atlantic In An Airship

Dr. Gans-Fabric, a German Aeronaut, Gives the Details of the Daring Plan That He Will Try to Execute.

(Special Cable from the International News Service.)
Berlin, April 16.—Dr. Gans-Fabric, the German aeronaut, who intends to attempt to traverse the Atlantic Ocean in an airship, has given the following particulars of his scheme:

"I shall be accompanied by Herr Bruckner, the editor of a Frankfurt newspaper, by a physician and by one engineer. I intend to start about the middle of May from either Cadix, Spain or Tenerife.

"This time of the year is chosen because there is an easterly wind which blows from the European to the American continent continuously, and with a force of nearly thirty miles an hour. It was to this wind that Columbus owed his success in discovering America.

"I desire to be an aerial Columbus, and, starting approximately from the same point, to be the first to reach America through the air. My course would lie across the Atlantic Ocean to Porto Rico, passing Cuba, and then across the Gulf of New Orleans. The distance of my course would be just over 4,000 miles.

"I estimate that I should cover this distance in five days. My airship now approaching completion is a combination of an ordinary balloon and a dirigible airship. The length of the balloon section is 175 feet, and its diameter, which is cigar-shaped, is 50 feet. The motor is 40 horse power.

"Owing to the favorable wind which I shall utilize, I only intend to use the motor in case of necessity, because it is not possible to take sufficient gasoline to keep the motor going for five days. The cubic contents of the balloon are quite sufficient to keep the airship aloft for 145 hours. That would be six days, or one day more than I require for the passage.

"Perhaps the most interesting feature of my airship is a cage forty feet long and ten feet wide. In case of necessity this can be sailed on the ocean as a motor boat, and if I run short of petrol, I can land on any island.

"Early in November the surgeons at the naval academy performed a delicate operation, removing the covering of four of the cervical vertebrae and relieving the pressure on the spinal cord. Wilson recovered his power of speech at once and seemed to be on the road to recovery until a week ago.

A FOOTBALL VICTIM

Gadet at Naval Academy, Injured Last Fall, Died This Morning.

Annapolis, Md., April 16.—Midshipman Earl D. Wilson, who was injured in the football game between Villanova and the navy last fall died at 5:30 o'clock this morning. He had been sinking for a week. Yesterday his condition became so serious that no hope of his recovery was held out. Wilson's home was in Covington, Ky., and he was one of the best pupils and all-around athletes in the academy. He was a member of the football, baseball, gymnastic and other athletic teams. In the Villanova game on October 16 he received a terrible spinal injury, stopping a mass rush. When he was picked up he was found to be totally paralyzed and for the first few days after the game his death was momentarily expected.
