Ben Noble Alleges that Mrs. Sprague Murdered Her Husband in His Bed.

HIS STORY IS DISCREDITED

(American News Service) Indianapolis, July 19.—Ben Noble, a farmhand brought to the Marion county jail following his arrest on suspicion in connection with the murder of Farmer Albert Sprague, was put through a grilling examination today during which he attempted to throw suspicion on Mrs. Sprague as the possible assassin of Sprague. He openly declared his belief that Mrs. Sprague shot her husband, with whom he says she frequently quarreled. Noble says Mrs. Sprague was jealous of him and Mrs. Sprague invariably befriended him (Noble) in disputes with her husband. Noble would not confess to any intimacy with Mrs. Sprague. The police discredit his stories regarding the crime and the circumstances connecting it.
