A BIG CATTLE SHOW

Proud Bovine Aristocrats Will Be Exhibited at St. Paul, Minnesota.

ALL MUST BE PEDIGRIED

St. Paul, Minn., July 20.—According to plans made for the northwestern live stock show to be held at Union Stock Yards, South St. Paul, November 15 to 18, aristocratic cattle will not find their names on the list of those invited, just because the blue blood of ancestry runs in their veins. The proud Angus, Holstein, Durham, Hereford or representatives of any other breed whose chief qualification is a pedigree which would fill a volume of the Congressional Record, will find himself lined up by the side of other animals whose claim to distinction is simply beef—good, wholesome, juicy, tender beef. And prizes will be awarded only to those which show the "beefiest" qualifications.

The northwestern exhibit will include market animals only. True, there will be plenty of animals shown which might be given pedigrees, but such statistics will not be taken into consideration by the men who do the judging. It will be one time when pedigree cattle will enter a contest of merit on the same ground as cattle of aristocracy. Many cases are on record where unpreserved cattle have shown up better than cattle whose owners boast of long pedigrees which go with them. At the northwestern exhibit, the heifer called "Maiden Lane, XIX," or "Queen Helen, X," will have no better rating than will just "Maud" or "Middy." And on the other hand, "King Leopold IV" will be on the same footing as "Big Tom" or just "Jim." There will be nothing in the name.

When the show has ended, many of the cattle will be sold on the market, which means they will be sold right where they are, as the event takes place on the Union Stock Yards ground. In this way, stock growers will learn much about what animals are best for slaughter purposes. An auction sale will also be held the last day of the show, at which all the stock exhibited may be offered for sale. This feature last year attracted much interest and caused many extra "shekels" to go into the coffers of the men who know how to produce good market cattle.

A SERIOUS CHARGE

FEELING IS BITTER

(American News Service) London, July 20.—The Salonic correspondent of the Temps sends an interesting message which shows how bitter the feeling is in Turkey against Greece.

"The Mussulman women," he says, "desiring to prove their loyalty, asked for permission to hold a meeting to protest against the annexation of Crete by Greece. The unmarried women and the widows were to swear publicly that they would not marry a man who, for any reason whatever, had not taken up arms against this annexation.

The Hall of Salonic thanked the ladies for this expression of loyalty but declined to authorize the meeting.

In the same town an economic war is being waged energetically against the Greeks, and in addition to the boycotting of vessels flying the Greek flag, the breaking off of relations with tradesmen suspected of Greek sympathies is being urged.

ADMITS HIS CRIME

(American News Service) Greensburg, Ind., July 20.—Ben Noble has confessed to killing Farmer Sprague, according to a statement of Sheriff Patterson, who left today for Indianapolis where Noble is confined.
