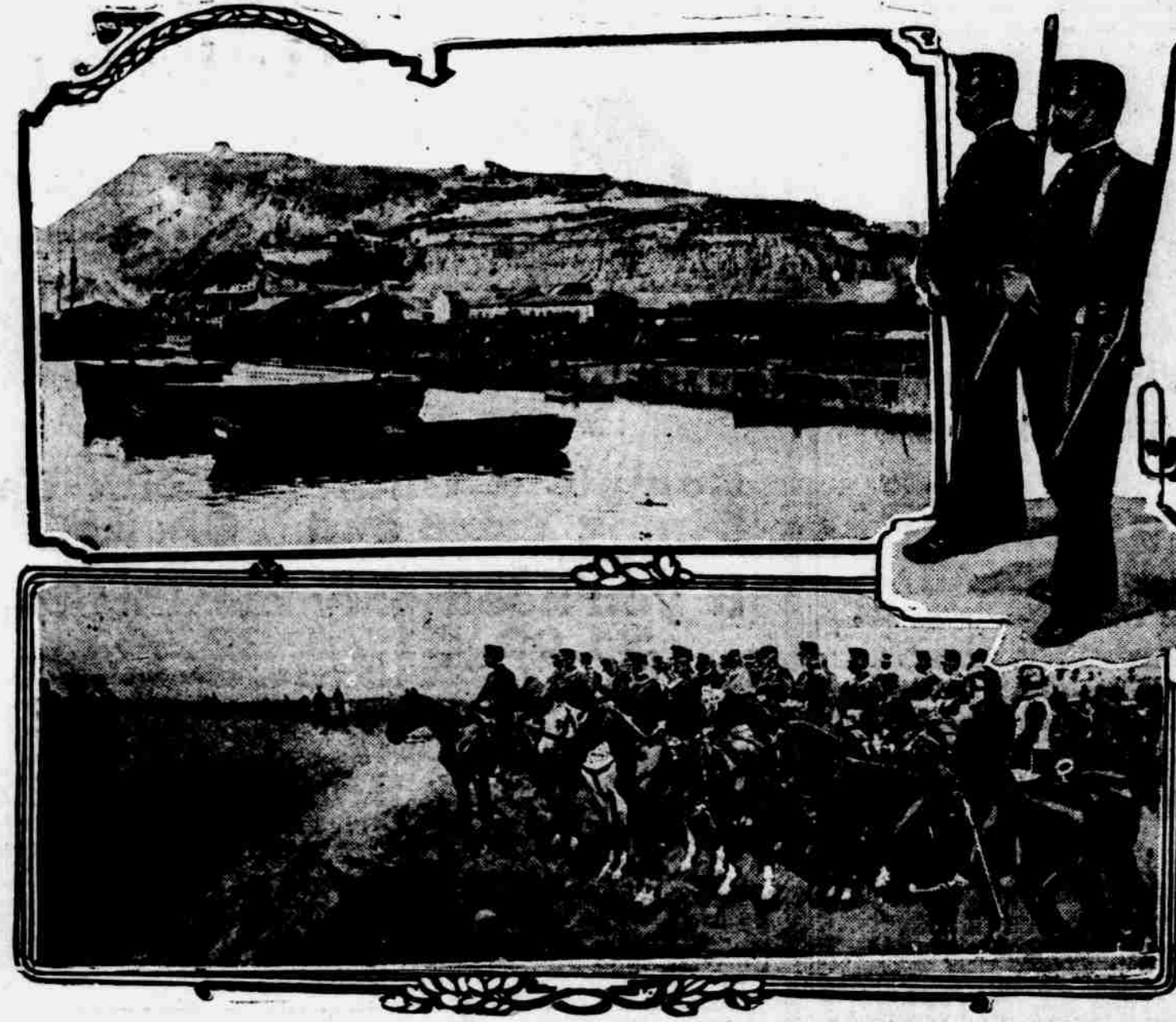

## REBELS ARE ACTIVE

Cuban Revolutionists Hiding in the Hills and Arming the Negroes.

## PUBLIC SHOWS ANXIETY

(American News Service.)  
Havana, July 27.—The rebel leaders, hiding in the hills of Santiago province, are arming the negroes, according to advices received here today. Though the government continues to profess no anxiety over the uprising, the public is uneasy. It is now believed that the insurgents have a strong force in hill retreats and that the small body that showed itself near El Caney, under Gen. Miniet, is but a fraction of the real force. President Gomez this morning, at the palace held another council of war. Reports reached Havana today to the effect that revenue cutters had searched a schooner off the coast of Oriente Province, where the government is exercising unusual vigilance to prevent the landing of an expedition thought to have sailed from Mexico. With the rurales and regulars pursuing Miniet forces through the hills fighting is believed to be imminent.

tered and worked their way into the surrounding country. Last night's search was fruitless. Shortly after daylight this morning Deputy Sheriff Rabey, Sub-Deputy Blue and Marshal Driscoll of Cambridge City, discovered McMullin sitting at the edge of a wood three quarters of a mile to the northwest of Dublin. Sounding the alarm the three men advanced. McMullin saw them coming and jumped to his feet. "Halt," yelled Rabey, Blue and Driscoll. McMullin's answer was a derisive shout as he turned and began sprinting through the woods. Rabey and Blue leveled their guns and fired. Halting, McMullin dropped behind a bush and opened fire. Several shots

were exchanged, none of the pursuing party being wounded. It is believed that during the exchange McMullin was struck as small drops of blood were later discovered on the grass and weeds a short distance beyond the bush behind which the fugitive let loose his fire.

He Evades Their Shots.

Leaping to his feet after firing several shots, McMullin raced through the woods. Firing as they ran the deputies' posse ran after the man who lurched into a wheat field. Dodging behind wheat shocks and running zigzag McMullin, evading the fire of his pursuers gained entrance to a cornfield. For a short distance the posse was able to follow his movements by the waving of the corn stalks but after a while lost all sight or indication of the fugitive.

Sheriff Meredith was notified today and ordered that the chase be continued until the fugitive is brought to hand.

A third searching party was organized at noon today and started on its way to the man hunt. Sheriff Meredith at two-thirty this afternoon arrived on the field and was in direct charge of the hunt.

## RAWN SHOT HIMSELF.

Chicago, July 27.—Coroner Hoffman officially announced today that the family of Ira G. Rawn has abandoned the theory that two shots were fired, having concluded that Rawn was killed by a shot from his own revolver while scuffling with a marauder.

## TRAIN STRIKES AUTO.

Springfield, Ill., July 27.—John P. Ferris and Mrs. N. A. Mansfield were instantly killed and N. A. Mansfield and J. B. Ferris fatally injured when an Illinois traction car struck their auto ten miles east of the city this morning. The occupants were hurled forty feet.

## COLUMBUS, O., GROWS.

Washington, July 27.—The census report on Columbus, Ohio, shows a population of 181,548, an increase of 55,988 in ten years.

## THREE MEN DYING.

Quebec, July 27.—Three men are dying today of injuries sustained yesterday when eleven were killed outright by the explosion of a train of dynamite on the Trans-continental railroad 125 miles west of La Tuque. Ten others were badly hurt. Investigation has shown that a workman's carelessness caused the accident.
