Notice is hereby given by the Board of Public Works of the City of Richmond, Indiana, that on the 28th day of July, 1910, they approved an assessment roll showing the prima facie assessments for the following described public improvement, an authorized by the Improvement Resolution named:

Improvement Resolution No. 218-1910. Providing for the improvement between South 14th and South 15th street by grading, graveling and bouldering and three-brick center, from South D street to South E street.

Improvement Resolution No. 220—1910. Providing for the improvement of the west side of South 15th street, from South D street to South E street, by the construction of a cement sidewalk 6 feet in width, except that portion already laid with cement, between the points named.

MOTT MAKES REPORT

A financial report of the Richmond school system just made by Superintendent T. A. Mott, shows an amount of \$92,140.54 on hand at the present time.

During the year closing July 31, 1910, \$343,954.40 was received and \$251,538.86 was expended. From the sale of school bonds, February, 1910, \$75,100 was realized in the bond fund. A sum of \$131,875.13 has already been spent on the new high school building, which will cost approximately \$225,000 when completed. Otherwise the financial report differs
