

## VETERANS MAKING GOOD IN MINORS

Ex-big Leaguers Are Stirring Things Up in the Various Bush Circuits.

### FERRIS IN SPLENDID FORM

FORMER ST. LOUIS PLAYER LEADING THIRD BATTER IN AMERICAN ASSOCIATION—OLD TIMERS LIKE CUBS.

It is doubtful if there has ever been a season when so many players turned down by the major leagues the year before have shown such remarkable reversal of form in the minor leagues. Take, for instance, the members of the Minneapolis team in the American association. The grand showing of the Millers in this year's race is due solely to the star playing of the major league castoffs—Ferris, Altizer, Rosman, Cravath, Williams, Owens and Tom Hughes. The Chicago Americans thought Owens and Altizer were not good enough and sent them back to the Class A league. Rosman was sold to Detroit to St. Louis, but he refused to play there and consequently was hurried off to the minors. The St. Louis Americans also fired Hobe Ferris and Jimmy Williams, believing that the pair had seen their best days. But it's dollars to doughnuts that Manager Jack O'Connor would give anything to have the pair back. Rosman would also help the Browns considerably.

It is due to the work of these veterans that Minneapolis is in line for the American association banner this season. The men are setting the league afire with their sensational batting and fielding. There is Jimmy Williams. James hit just about .220 last season with the Browns. The wonderful life renewer, release to the American association, has brought James back to the .300 brigade. He is now hitting .332.

Cravath had two chances to make good in the majors and failed because he was unable to swing. Now he is batting .352, according to the latest American association marks.

Otis Clymer was hammering somewhat like .108 last year with Washington. It is 298 with Minneapolis this season.

Altizer was another .155 swatter with the White Sox. Now it is .301 with Minneapolis. Tom Hughes' arm was in such poor shape that Washington sent him to Minneapolis last fall. His work this season has been so good that Manager Cantillon has advised Jimmy McAleer of the Senators to give him another trial in fast company.

Hobe Ferris is leading the third batters in Chivington's league with a

high percentage. He is also batting like a streak. Last year he hit around .216 for St. Louis. This season Ferris is walloping the sphere at a .380 clip.

Here is a list of others who are doing wonderful work and who were failures last year in fast company:

Ach Loole Ritter of Kansas City was released by Brooklyn because he was hitting nearer .100 than .200. He is batting .325 in the American association.

Charles Hickman had slowed up in his hitting years ago and was released by Cleveland. Now he is batting .319 for Toledo.

Betting averages of the other ex-big leaguers are: Jerry Downs .264, Hayden .285, Charlie Jones .284, Josh Clarke .251, Frank Bowerman .273. They all look strong to us who were used to their .250, .240 and .150 averages with Detroit, Boston Americans, Cleveland and Boston Nationals.

Dutch Koshler, who hit .220 when with St. Louis, is batting .299 for the South Bend Central league club. Dutch is again wanted by Bob Hedges.

Jimmy Barrett, while we are talking of "vets," can be spoken of. Last time in the big arena Jim hit .300 or thereabouts. Now he has a sticklag mark of .264.

## ENGINE RIPS UP A SLEEPING CAR

Narrow Escape from Serious Accident at Local Pan-handle Station.

### C. & O. BRIDGE IS BURNED

FREIGHT TRAIN MAKES A DASH ACROSS STRUCTURE WITHOUT ACCIDENT—ENGINEER COULD NOT SEE BLAZE.

A serious wreck was narrowly averted at the Pennsylvania station yesterday when an engine and tender ran through an open switch in the west end of the Pennsylvania sheds. The engine crashed into the side of a sleeper standing on a siding. The car was turned almost over and the side ripped out. Three passengers who were in the car were unhurt, except for a severe shaking. They were removed and placed in another car. The sleeper was in a cut of cars from St. Louis bound to Northern Michigan. Engineer Anderson, in charge of the locomotive is not held to blame for the accident. The damage was not over \$100.

One of the most remarkable escapes from a wreck experienced by early crews on the C. & O. line, was yesterday morning, when a south bound freight No. 93 ran over a burning trestle near Perry's bottom, about a mile north of Richmond. The trestle is a long one and had been burning some time when the train approached. A sharp turn in the track keeps the bridge from view and the train struck it at full speed to find the wood work in a fierce blaze. It is supposed to have started from an engine spark.

Although seven ties and much frame work was burned the train passed over without accident, with the exception of the rear car, which jumped the rail but immediately replaced itself. In the middle the tracks were spread several inches. Conductor O. P. Kefler and Engineer Charles Gibson, had charge of the train. They state the escape was nothing short of a miracle.

## FOUND NO EVIDENCE

Because of lack of evidence Ferris Hayden Holinger, arrested on complaint of William Austin, who charged her with stealing \$200, was released yesterday. There have been no developments in the case. In Saturday's issue of the Palladium, Austin was quoted as saying Howard Harris, colored, was connected with the case. Harris declared this morning he was in no way implicated and that Austin bore him a grudge. He said the police were not looking for him, as stated by Austin.

## IRELAND IS WINNER

Sydney Buxton, the postmaster general, has written John Redmond, the Irish Nationalist leader, according to an announcement made today that the Cunard line ships, excepting the Mauretania and Lusitania, will call at Queenstown beginning with September 1, and the company will reconsider the arrangements for 1911. A bitter fight has been waged by the Irish on the substitution of Fishguard, Wales, for Queenstown.

### TO CLEAN DITCH.

The Scott ditch three miles east of the city will be cleaned out this fall. The property owners through whose land the ditch runs petitioned Wayne township trustee James Howarth for the cleaning of the ditch and the county surveyor has been instructed to proceed. This is the first time in twenty years that the ditch has been cleaned.

## HE WANTS HIS PAY

Herbert Green Says the City Has Been Helping Itself to Gravel.

### FILES CLAIM WITH BOARD

Declaring that the city is using his gravel, Herbert Green, the liveryman, was before the board of works this morning. He asked the city to allow him for fifty loads taken from the Whitewater river. It is stated that Mr. Green leased a portion of the river bottom from the Carpenter Rolling mills and that he had been using the gravel about a year.

In making some repairs at the Municipal light plant, city employees removed a large quantity of gravel some of which was taken from the bed of Mr. Green. He also said the democratic administration took over a hundred wagon loads from the bank. He will file a claim against the city. The board promised to investigate the matter and remedy it at once.

Two completed improvements were approved by the board, first, the construction of a cement alley between North G and North H street from Eighth to Tenth street; also the construction of a sewer from the present sewer on North Eighth street at the first alley north of North I, east to North Tenth; also in the first alley west of North Tenth from the alley north of North I south to North I street. Primary assessment rolls were ordered prepared in both cases.

## YATES FOR CANNON

## TO RELEASE IORIO

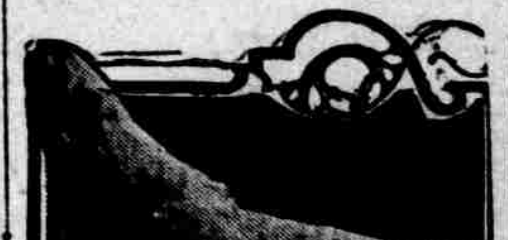
Officials Satisfied His Killing of His Best Friend Was an Accident.

### ACTING IN SELF DEFENSE

Louis Iorio, who is held in the county jail for shooting Italo Fontana at the Italian camp near Cambridge City on last Monday evening, will be released from custody in a few days. Judge Fox of the circuit court, prosecuting attorney Charles Ladd and Coroner A. L. Brankamp, all of whom conducted an investigation, are satisfied that the Italian shot in self defense, not at Fontana who was his best friend, but at Julio Pellegrini, with whom he was quarrelling. Coroner Brankamp has pronounced the death of Fontana to be due to an accident.

Iorio is held in the county jail on a charge of carrying concealed weapons. The more serious charge of manslaughter was not placed against him by the prosecuting attorney, he says, because he was satisfied all the time that the affair was an accident. If any prosecution is made at all it probably will be on the affidavit on which he is held and conviction means a light fine with or without jail confinement.
