The wrecks occurring on the different traction lines in the state of Indiana during the last week is just cause for every T. P. A. to shudder with horror and wonder when his time may come. The wreck on the New Castle branch of the T. H. I. & E. last Saturday, the one on the Muncie-Union City line last Sunday, the terrible catastrophe on the Bluffton line and the head-on collision on the Union Traction line only yesterday sum up a week's history in the traction life of Indiana that will long remain a black page in the management of these several lines. Much is heard and said relative to the operation of cars. Severe, and sometimes unjust criticism is heaped upon the officials of the different roads. If one will care to investigate into the operation of the different lines it will be found that in most cases ample and proper safeguards are established. If only the crews of the cars properly carry out the rules of the companies. Yes, the crews are in most cases to blame for these ever occurring collisions on traction lines. Too often the crews take the running of cars entirely into their own hands and throw aside all regard for rules, train orders and all the established ways of the companies. This disregard and violation of train orders is something in which the traveling public is highly interested. The only safeguard the traveling public has is the proper execution of train rules and orders for the crews in charge. A thousand rules on any system man might devise would come to naught if the trainmen continue to disobey and run cars to suit their own fancy.

Disobedience of orders is the cause of such awful loss of life and such terrible injuries. Something must be done to bring the trainmen to a realization of their responsibilities. Some punishment drastic, severe, and quick must be meted out to these violators of company rules. Running by sidings or running cars ahead of schedule is something that must stop. The traction companies must see to it that their crews run the cars according to their rules and orders. To run by a passing point should be cause for immediate dismissal from the employ of the company. When the trainmen are made to understand that a train order is an order to be executed to the last letter the running past meeting points will cease, the awful loss of life will be greatly lessened, and sorrow and sadness will not be found in so many homes as is the case throughout Indiana today.

Many of the boys of post C travel in the northern part of the state and the wives at home were considerably alarmed at the first reports. Only one traveling man was killed on the ill fated car, his home being in Bryan, Ohio.

It behoves every one eligible to the T. P. A. to get in line, become a member and then have a T. P. A. accident policy. It is needed nowadays.

Resignations in Advance.

If Fred Shane and James P. The resignations, under blank date, will be addressed to the governor of Ohio, but will be held by the officers of the Toledo labor congress. The made in advance resignations will be forwarded to the chief executive of the state, the offices will become vacant and the ousted legislators repudiated by the voters who elected them.
