Belfast, Oct. 20.—An ocean steamer that will rank among the wonders of the world was to be launched today at the yards of Harland & Wolff in this city. The steamer is the Olympic and close by is her sister ship the Titanic, which will also soon be ready to take her initial plunge in the deep.

While nothing seems to be impossible with ship builders, there are many bold enough to prophesy that, so far as size is concerned, these steamers are the last word in the building of merchant ships. They are being built for the Oceanic Steam Navigation company, more widely known as the White Star line, and will ply between Liverpool and New York. The new vessels will have a displacement of 45,000 tons. They are to be 860 feet long with a beam of 90 feet and the boat deck will be more than 60 feet above the water, in both tonnage and size they will surpass the Mauretania and Lusitania, although they are not expected to do in speed. The lines of the new ships are not designed for great speed, 21 knots being the average aimed at, as against the 25 of the giant Cunarders. An immense amount of space, which in fast boats is devoted to machinery, will thus be saved for cabin accommodation. The carrying capacity of the Olympic and Titanic will exceed that of any ships afloat today by at least one-third. Each ship will carry under normal conditions, more than 5,000 persons all told.

Are Floating Hotels.

In almost every respect the new ships will be floating hotels. Dancing rooms, smoking rooms, cafes, a library and even gardens are to occupy prominent positions in these wonderful vessels. There will be a cool avenue of Oriental palms, beds of roses and carnations, and arbors skillfully contrived by expert gardeners. In the winter months all these are to be protected by glass roofs. Among other interesting innovations will be a swimming bath, sufficiently deep for diving and a skating rink.

The suites of cabins are to be in their design and fittings equal to the rooms in the finest hotels of Europe, and families will be able to cross the Atlantic in almost the same privacy as in their own homes. There are to be many dining rooms, the principal one of which will be elaborately decorated and will seat no fewer than six hundred. Those who wish to take their meals on deck can do so at a "veranda cafe" situated on one of the upper decks fifty feet above the level of the water. All the cafes will be decorated in a remarkable manner. They will be fashioned to represent those of the Riviera. Exposed rafters will be twined with vines, and to complete the illusion, the attendants will be similar to those in Southern Europe.

The Olympic and Titanic will be as complete in their safety appliances as in their luxurious equipment. Each boat will be divided into upward of thirty steel compartments, separated by heavy bulkheads. An automatic device on the bridge will control all these heavy steel doors, making it possible for a single hand to close them all in case of danger.

A combination of turbine and reciprocating engines will propel the ships. It is expected that a great economy of coal will be effected by this arrangement. The crews will be the largest ever employed on merchant ships, each vessel carrying more than 600 officers and men. The displacement of each vessel when loaded will be nearly 50,000 tons. It is expected that both ships will be ready to enter service early next spring.

Will Again Be Investigated to
Learn if Sanitation Af-
fects Dairymen.

HEIRONIMUS IS IN CHARGE

If dairymen operating with high class and most modern equipment are driven out of business at the price which dairymen now receive for their products, the municipal research bureau believes that there is something radically wrong. N. C. Heironimus, a member of the research bureau was authorized at the meeting on Wednesday evening to go ahead and investigate the cost and conditions under which milk is sold in other cities in Indiana. The committee took up the milk question soon after the Commons' Dairy company went into the hands of a trustee.

It is probable that an agitation for

Gertrude Atherton, Novelist,
Who Smokes, Says It Is
a Pleasant Pastime.

PRACTICE TAKES NERVE

VERSIONS STAND IN WAY.

Chicago, Oct. 20.—"Well," said Mrs. Gertrude Atherton, "if you ask me, I see no reason why women shouldn't smoke cigarettes. Neither, I fancy, do many women of the better class in America, for I am sure they do, and quite freely too, in their own homes, although, of course, they refrain from smoking in public. Most of them, though, once they have acquired the habit, probably would like to have their license to smoke when and where they please extended. And why shouldn't they enjoy the same privilege as men in that regard?"

In a Brief Visit Here.

Mrs. Atherton made those statements at the LaSalle hotel, where she is a guest in a brief stay in Chicago on her way from her home in San Francisco to the East.

"I know there is a certain stodgy, bourgeois sentiment against smoking," she continued. "I hear that club women and persons of that sort occasionally indulge in pious animadversions upon smoking women. And often some public lecturer will get up and make herself ridiculous denouncing the practice, but cigarette smoking is increasing rapidly in America nevertheless. And why shouldn't it? It's a pleasant pastime."

Some Use Them Secretly.

"I'll venture to say that many of those women who make so much fuss in public, go home and light a cigarette in their own rooms and help pass a dull evening. Surely you'll not be surprised to learn that at the houses where I am entertained in New York and San Francisco cigarettes are passed to the women with their coffee as a matter of course. And wherever women have become frank and have lost their little hypocritical nerves, you will find them smoking.


