

RAILROADS WILL FIGHT GOV. STUBBS

Former Wayne County Resident is Hated by the Big Interests in Kansas.

BREWERS IN THE PLAN

WORK WILL PROBABLY BE DONE OUT OF CHICAGO WHERE CORPORATIONS HAVE AN OFFICE—STANDPATTERS OPPOSED.

Governor W. Ross Stubbs, of Kansas, who is a native of Wayne county, will have tough sledding in the November election according to dispatches from that state. The corporations, principally the railroads and brewers are averse to his reelection. He is fighting all the harder and it would not surprise his friends if his success, if elected would be by the greatest majority ever given a candidate for the chief executive of that state. An account from Topeka is as follows:

Definite information that the brewers and the reactionaries of Kansas have entered into a combination to beat Gov. Stubbs and his followers in the coming election has come to light.

Today is the day set for the combination to begin work and as fast as the organization can be completed it is to be extended to every county of the state where these interests feel that they have a chance to win. Every effort is to be made to get every voter that is now against prohibition, the Stubbs ideas, and the insurgent congressional propaganda out to the polls.

The brewery interests have an office in Chicago from which the campaign is being conducted and this office has indicated to Kansas liberals that there is a large "barrel" open for good work in Kansas. The plan is to elect members of the legislature who are favorable to recommitment and to elect county attorneys and sheriffs who are known to be liberal in their views and who will not be likely to interfere with the jointists in their counties.

The standpatters and the reactionary politicians are opposed to Stubbs and the six progressive nominees for congress and they are said to be working in combination with the Democrats.

LEISURE PERIODS OF RUSSIAN POOR

Like Motion Pictures and Play Ruhi in Roadside Inns in Evening.

WILL HAVE THEIR JOKES

YOUNG PLAY WITH THE OLD AND THE CATHOLIC CLERGY SHARE IN THE AMUSEMENTS WITH THE PEASANTS.

New York, Oct. 21.—A St. Petersburg correspondent of the Sun writes: "They play ruhi," was the first response that came to my mind when some non-Russian friends asked what is the outdoor pastime of the young Russian peasants. It was expected from me after a month's sojourn on the land some hundred verses from newspapers, street lamps or pavements that some first hand impression remained of the kind of daily life led by the krestians—the wearers of a cross which most of them do wear next to the skin suspended round their necks; the term mujik is misplaced when applied to them. They would take it to mean yokel and resent it. But the hundred million of land workers who are the flocks of the state church and whose sons are the army are krestians. And they play ruhi.

Like Skittles or Quoits.

The first time that the game met my eye was on a summer evening outside Volkl Luki, a farmer's market place in the south of Pskoff. On a road running past the churchyard about a dozen players were at it, and about twice as many more standing or lying by the roadside. The skill needed for the game recalled quoits of skittles, or the German Kugelspiel. But there are great differences. The Russians throw neither disc nor ball, but a thick staff, narrow enough at the top for the hand to grip tightly. Twenty paces apart in the middle of the road were the targets. Looked at sideways, they were triangles of wooden cogs piled on one another, the narrow edge faced the throwers at either end. A crease was cut across the roadway a few feet before and behind these piles of ruhi. The players gathered at each end, the net who scattered all the ruhi outside of the crease with the fewest throws had won.

Seated on the upturned empty wooden chest used for holding the implements of the game—they were kept with the sexton inside the churchyard—was Otekt Vassili, Father Vassili, the pastor of the commune, a sunburned, gray bearded old worthy. He pointed out his son among the players. No, the son—a tall youth wearing the blue uniform of a university student—was not going to enter the clergy. "Michael Vassilivich is to be a veterinarian," he said, with paternal approval and introduced us. The two explained the finer points of the game.

Skill of First Man.
Much depends on the first throw, and for that the best player opened the game. If he struck the cogs too low down they scattered sideways and mostly remained inside the crease making a greater number of throws necessary for his successors. If he hit too high only the two or three ruhi at the apex were carried away and the next man had to dislodge the pile so that the lightweights later in the team could throw out the scattered cogs by twos and threes. For some hours every evening in the month of long daylight and when the roadway was not a mudpuddle, enough youngsters and full grown men, some of them over forty, turned up casually to make two teams.

"Excellent gymnastics," was Father Vassili's comment.

BAD EGG VENDERS

Food Commissioner Barnard Wants Power to Deal With These Men.

ASK LAW BE AMENDED

Indianapolis, Oct. 21.—H. E. Barnard, state food and drug commissioner will give the greater part of his attention in the next session of the general assembly to proposed amendments to the food and drug laws, which would enable his department to prevent the farmer from selling bad eggs and the owner of milk vending establishments from selling impure and dirty milk. His recommendations on these two points have been endorsed by the state board of health and a campaign will be begun as soon as the successful candidates for the general assembly are announced after the November election.

Under the present law regulating the sale of eggs, the department feels that it was slipped upon by some clever legislator when the bill was under consideration. By some means the word "knowingly" was inserted in the bill, so that under its operation, the authorities must be able to show that a producer knew bad eggs to be bad when he sold them in order to make a prosecution successful. Scores of prosecutions have been made under the law, but except in one instance all have failed, because the department was unable to prove that the seller knew the eggs to be bad when he sold them.

The proposed amendment is to be aimed at the farmers rather than at the wholesale and retail dealers. The latter classes are supposed to test all eggs purchased and to reject the bad ones, which they somewhat generally do. But the farmer does not testing, with the result that the buyers find, according to the figures, an average of two bad eggs in every dozen bought throughout the country. Since few dealers take the risk of being caught selling bad eggs they are compelled to stand the loss of the two bad eggs, and prices quoted to producers are usually made so that the dealer can throw out the bad eggs and still make his profit. Buyers who know the producers in their territory and know them to sell only good eggs, sometimes pay higher prices to persons whose product they know to be good, but these are exceptional cases.
