To Educate Voters on the Proposed Amendment to the Constitution.

IS A NONPARTISAN MOVE

Attorneys Wilfred Jessup and Will W. Reller have been named by the State Bar association to carry forward in Wayne county the campaign of education needed to secure the adoption of an amendment authorizing the state legislature to legislate in such a way as to further advance the standard of the bar. The purpose is to require greater qualifications for the practice of law. The amendment is to be voted on at the November election and it is felt that if the voters fully understand the matter they will endorse it. The movement is nonpartisan. Attorneys Jessup and Reller met Tuesday afternoon to outline their plan of campaign and they will undertake to give the matter such publicity that all may understand for what they are asked to vote. The amendment failed once for lack of a majority and it was due to the fact that the voters were not properly informed.

A REMARKABLE CASE

San Antonio, Tex., Oct. 25.—After lying for three months paralyzed and practically speechless in such a condition that an operation would endanger her life, Miss Anna Carroll, who was wounded by a revolver in the hands of Jas. P. Earl, Jr., her fiancé, after a quarrel, is now recovering at Santa Rosa hospital and physicians are pronouncing it the most remarkable case of its kind the local medical fraternity has seen in years. Paralysis of the right side had followed the shooting and as a last result a difficult operation on the skull whereby the pressure on the brain was released was performed. This was after she had rallied little by little and an X-ray picture had been taken to show the extent of the wounds in the skull. Small particles of bone were embedded in the brain and their removal, to insure a return to health, was imperative. Now the young woman is able to talk, understand and move freely all her limbs and complete recovery is predicted.

MRS. CLARKE WILL GIVE FEDERATION MUCH TO DISCUSS

President of State Organization Has Summarized Work Which Will Be Presented to the Delegates.

CONSERVATION IS TO GET CONSIDERATION

Club Women Will Also Be Urged to Co-operate with Red Cross Society in Its Humanitarian Work.

When the State Federation of Women's Clubs meets Wednesday morning in its first formal session, Mrs. Grace Julian Clarke, the president, will present to the convention for its consideration a number of important matters. The statement by Mrs. Clarke covers many of the subjects that will be considered by the Federation, and they are of vital importance to the welfare of the Federation and of great significance to the state at large.

The statement as it will be submitted by Mrs. Clarke is as follows:

I. (a) Education, comprising art and music; Library, Literature, Reciprocity, Press and Parent-Teaching Associations.

(b)—Conservation, comprising Civics, Household Economics, Health, Food Sanitation, Forestry and Highways, Industrial and Social Conditions, and the Merit System.

(c)—Legislative, to take charge of such measures as the Federation decides actively to work for. II. That District Chairmen send to the corresponding secretary in September of each year nominations for each of these departments, stating whether the nominee would be efficient as chairman or only as a member—this information to be turned over to the incoming administration, thus expediting its work and insuring excellent committees.

III. That a history of the Indiana Federation be prepared and placed on file, a history that shall include brief accounts of the two organizations of which this is the outgrowth, together with as complete a collection as possible of all year books, programs of annual meetings, etc., and that the incoming executive committee be authorized to select a historian.

IV. That every club in the State Federation be urged to select a Federation secretary, and to devote fifteen minutes once each month to a consideration of the work of the General and State Federations; also to print

names of town and congressional district in club year-book.

V. That a map of Indiana, showing the congressional districts, be placed in the next State Federation year-book.

VI. That our literature committee be instructed to prepare ten model programs for the use of clubs, each along a definite line, with references. Some clubs would not care for these, but many would, and the prosecution of a particular line of work would make it possible to secure from the State Library Commission books that would be useful in the preparation of club papers.

VII. That district chairmen take orders for year books at 15 cents each, while in Richmond, so that the executive committee may know how many to have printed. A year book is sent to the president of each club, gratis, but in order to be intelligent on State Federation affairs, every club woman should have a copy and should study it.

VIII. There is a splendid opportunity open to the Federation to perform in Indiana a broad and effective work in the name of humanity. The Red Cross is about to enter upon its third Indiana season for the sale of Christmas seals—heretofore known as Christmas stamps. Clubs in the Federation have helped in this work before, but as a Federation we have never taken hold of it in a systematic and thorough way. It is the purpose of the Red Cross authorities to utilize

ize the money to establish colonies or cottages in cities of our state where victims of the plague may obtain proper treatment; also to pay the way of patients in hospitals. Colonies of cottages have been established at Indianapolis, Evansville and South Bend. Some of the money has been spent in Lafayette and other cities, while \$1,500 in cash was turned over to the Flower Mission in Indianapolis for its white plague work this year in that city.

Help Sell the Seals.

It has been demonstrated that the public will aid in this great work by the purchase of the seals, but these must be within easy reach of the public. It is in getting the seals on sale that the clubs can be very helpful. Last year the stamps were sold in 150 Indiana cities and towns, while there were hundreds of cities and towns that were not reached because of the difficulty the Red Cross had in finding local workers.

I therefore recommend that each club in the Federation appoint a Christmas seal committee early in November to sell and place on sale as many seals as possible. Clubs will not be at any expense in this work, the necessary seals and other supplies being provided free by the Red Cross. A letter will be sent to each club early in November with detailed instructions, and I beg of you to respond at once, for the stamp selling campaign is necessarily short, and quick work is required.

IX. That delegates on returning to their homes, endeavor not only to disseminate the knowledge of the proceedings of this convention, but of the aims and purposes of our State Federation of clubs.
