

CASE GOES TO JURY

Case Against Robt Stines, Colored, for Alleged Attack on Girl Ended.

WAS HARD TO GET A JURY

The jurors of the Wayne circuit court before whom Robert Stines, colored, was tried for alleged assault on Mabel Muey, white, when she was fourteen years old received the case late on Friday afternoon. The trial was started Thursday, much time being consumed in the selection of a jury, and the remainder of the day in the introduction of evidence by the state. Not sufficient evidence was introduced by the state to allow the defense much opportunity and its witnesses, the majority character witnesses, were examined in a few hours on Friday morning. The arguments of the attorneys consumed four hours each side having two hours in which to address the jurors.

The state excused four from jury service, the defense two and the court three. Those excused include M. M. Chenoweth, Fred W. His wife, aged forty, also perished, burning to death in the apartments. Thirty persons were heroically rescued by firemen.

Superintendent of Automatic Tool Works Dies at a Boarding House.


DEATH WAS UNEXPECTED
