

## A MORE STRINGENT LAW IS ADVOCATED

### Ministers Appeal to Govern- or to Advise Better Mar- riage License Law.

At a meeting of the Ministerial association this forenoon a resolution was drafted calling upon Governor Marshall to incorporate in his forthcoming message to the legislature a recommendation that the laws governing the issuance of marriage licenses be made more stringent. The association believes this would be an excellent remedy for the divorce evil.

The following resolution was also ordered by the association:

"We, the ministers' Association, of Richmond, Ind., after two weeks of united evangelistic service under the leadership of George Gordon Mahy, of Montrose, Pa., during which time we have had opportunity to judge of the man, the message and the method, desire to express our conviction that the meetings have proven the wisdom and devotion of Mr. Mahy and his associates, Mr. Harmon and Mrs. Morgan, and their humble dependence upon the Holy Spirit for guidance and power. We would express our approval of the clear, evangelical messages of salvation by faith in Jesus Christ, and their fidelity to the Word of God. We wish also to endorse the methods employed in these services, free from all sensationalism and undue emotional excitement, but full of dignity, earnestness and sanity, bringing men to a serious, definite decision for Christ. Especially do we endorse the emphasis laid upon the personal work of Christians, and their personal responsibility for the salvation of their fellow men.

We therefore call upon the Christian men and women of Richmond and vicinity to lay aside all personal, social and business engagements where possible, and to join themselves to the undivided support of this aggressive campaign to win souls to Christ during this closing week.

### To Make an Inspection of Easthaven.

An inspection of Eastern Indiana Hospital for the insane will be made on Tuesday by the legislative committee of the next Indiana legislature. The members are: Joseph M. Cravens, representative from Madison county; J. J. Netterville, state senator from Anderson, and Miles J. Furnas, representative from Randolph county. The purpose of the visit is to inspect the buildings and grounds, learn what must be done at the institution during the ensuing year and also what would be of great advantage to it. The committee will report on its inspection, first to Governor Marshall so that he may incorporate, if he believes it necessary, recommendations in his message to the legislature and then the committee reports to both branches of the legislature after its opening.

Bilbo, a member of the State senate, in the notable contest in the legislature which resulted in the election of United States Senator Percy.
