Fred W. Lehmann, a St. Louis attorney was today offered the office of solicitor general of the department of justice, to succeed Lloyd W. Bowers.

NEW MAIL ROUTES HAVE BEEN FORMED

Postmaster, E. M. Haas, has completed the re-districting of the city into mail routes, and last night at a meeting of the carriers there was a smoker and assignment of the new routes. Two routes have been added, having been formed from routes already in existence. Both of these are in the east end of town, one north and the other south of Main street. The two new carriers allowed the local postoffice after three months' hard work by E. M. Haas. The mail service of the city will be greatly improved by the addition of the new routes.

REPORTS FOR LAST MONTH MADE TODAY

The police arrested a total of sixty-seven persons last month. The arrests were as follows: Vagrancy 3, robbing the United States mails 1, drunk 26, giving liquor to a minor 2, provoke 4, fugitive from justice 2, forger 1, assault and battery 9, larceny 4, carrying concealed weapons 2, house breaking 3.

The month's weather report from the government station at the pumping station shows that the maximum was reached November 9 with a temperature of 67 degrees. The minimum was November 17 when the temperature registered 17 degrees above zero. The total rainfall for the month was something over an inch.

INVESTED IN BONDS

Was the Money of the Late Charles Land.

The late Charles N. Land, who died about a year ago as a result of an operation for appendicitis, while on a business trip to Canada, had a large part of his money invested in stocks and bonds. A petition by the administrator, Frank Land, to transfer the stocks to the decedent's heirs, including the widow and two minor children, Emeline and Dorothy, has been approved by the court. Mrs. Land is guardian for the children and their third interests in the estate have been turned over to her for administration.

The stocks and the value at which they were placed, according to the petition, included ten shares of Gauss Scott and Company of the par value of \$50 but appraised at \$1,125; twenty shares in the Second National bank of the value of \$4,000; sixteen shares in the Dickinson Trust company, appraised at the par value, \$1,600; twenty-five shares of the Van Camp Packing company, appraised at \$2,500; four shares of the Masonic building stock, the par value of which is \$100, and eight bonds of the Richmond school city, valued at \$500 each. The total value of the stocks as shown in the petition is \$13,325.

Agnes R.: You can have pink cheeks, red lips and also add from ten to thirty pounds to your weight, which is below normal, by having this prescription filled: compound syrup hypophosphites 6 ozs., compound essence cardiol 1 oz. Mix, shake the bottle well and take a teaspoonful after meals if the appetite is not good, or before meals if it is. After the first week gradually increase the dose to two teaspoonfuls of the mixture. Also take 3-grain hypo-nuclease tablets to increase the weight, as per directions accompanying carton.

Bess: Blackheads, pimples, boils, sore spots and large pores in skin of the face can be readily overcome by the following treatment, local and internal. Have your druggist mix an ointment of rose-kayolin 2 1/2 drams and lanolin 2 ozs. Wash the skin with soap and hot water; dry thoroughly, and apply ointment thinly two or three times daily. The ointment is flesh colored and does not attract attention. Obtain a tube of 3-grain sulphur tablets and take one to four daily, so that bowels move freely two or three times daily. This treatment removes blackheads, heals pimples and sores and prunes the blood and skin, when everything else is impotent. A more rapid cure may follow if the face is massaged once a day with plain yellow mineral, which is packed in 4-ounce jars, and carried by most druggists.
