

MECHANICAL FAN SYSTEM REGARDED A VERY GOOD ONE

Dr. King Will Probably Find There Are Minor Defects, But System as a Whole Is Satisfactory.

field building. In Room 10 a bookcase was found to be blocking half of the foul air duct and the principal was advised to remove it to some other part of the room. Dr. King told the janitor to open a closed foul air duct leading to a five foot outside stack in the girls' toilet on the second floor. Dr. King suggested that a shield for the diffusion of the air on the intake in Room 8 be changed slightly to give better results.

Air Meter Tests.

The outside intake furnishing fresh air for the whole building was found to be providing 78 cubic feet per pupil per minute. The air meter tests in the rooms resulted as follows: Room 2, 38 cubic feet per pupil and 19 cubic feet per seat; Room 3, 14 cubic feet per seat and 31 cubic feet per pupil; Room 8, 33 cubic feet per pupil.

A lack of light space in all of the rooms of the Hibbard school with the exception of one, a recitation room, was found by Dr. King. Other than this there was no defect discovered or criticism made. A ladder and several wooden horses were found laying in the doorways temporarily. This led to the instructions to the janitor that the doorways always be kept unobstructed so there could be a rapid exit of the pupils in case of fire. The toilets were in good condition and all rooms were receiving a sufficient quantity of fresh air.

That a large amount of good has resulted from the inspection, cannot be questioned. Information was furnished the janitors at all buildings so that the volume dampers in the ventilating systems can be adjusted to give the right proportion of air in the rooms, and an unsanitary condition in one of the high school rooms was disclosed, resulting in the abandonment of that room for classwork; a foul air duct system in the Warner school affording an excellent escape for bad air was opened up; non-flushing toilets in the Warner, Starr and Whitewater schools were discovered; the need of better facilities for the escape of foul air in the attics of the old part of the high school building, Whitewater and Valle schools was pointed out; an insufficient intake at the Valle building making it impossible for the pupils to receive the minimum requirement of fresh air was exposed; deficient system of ventilating was discovered at the Garfield school; and general authoritative information regarding the schools supplied the public.

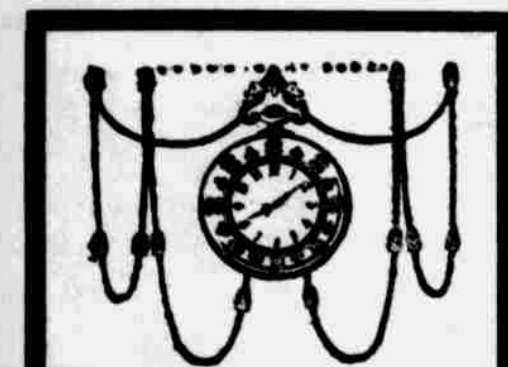

half of this property is within Wayne township and the city of Richmond.

The inventory also shows that on January 1, 1911, there were school fund loans by the county totaling \$205,610.95. All interest was paid up on all loans. The loans are secured by first mortgages on real estate within the county. At the present time there is less than \$5,000 on hand in the county school fund which is available for loans. The school fund is subdivided into three funds, common, congressional and permanent endowment funds. The total amount of each fund outstanding in loans, secured by mortgages, is: Common school fund, \$169,951; congressional school fund, \$32,651.65; and permanent endowment fund, \$3,990.

JIM MAHER TODAY EXILED FOR LIFE

Mayor Hands Out Little Russian Justice to an Habitual Drunkard.

Exiled from Richmond, his native town, for life.

Such a sentence was pronounced on James Maher by Mayor Zimmerman in police court this morning. Maher is an "old timer," who has been convicted for intoxication ten times in the last fourteen months. Maher was released about a week ago after serving a four months sentence. He was up for drunk the next day. The court released him on a promise to get out of town.

Yesterday Patrolman Vogelsohn found him on South Eleventh street, where he was trying to climb a telegraph pole.

If Maher ever comes back, which he says he'll never do, he will be sent to the county jail for solitary confinement, on a diet of bread and water for 140 days and following the expiration of that sentence he will get a "repeat," making a total sentence nearly ten months.

"Never again," said Jim, raising his hand piously, after the court had ex-

iled him "I'm goin' to the country and never comin' back."

Maher is one of the best cattle judges in Wayne county when he is sober. Jim left town at 11:30 o'clock having been given two hours to leave.

"I remember the time my husband entered his second race for congress. I got out and worked for him. I helped write speeches for him and as long as I live I will never forget those struggles.

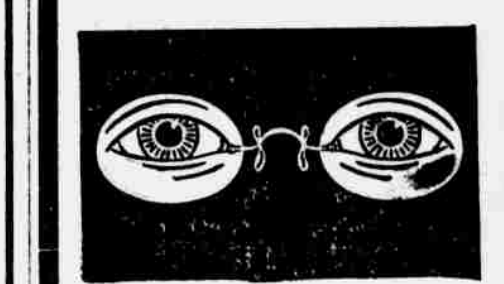

TWO FATHERS WILL LOSE TWO CHILDREN

Complications arising in the Wayne circuit court in two divorce cases, as a result of husbands deserting their wives, have been adjusted. No provision for alimony could be made in either case as personal summons had not been issued on the defendants, yet they will lose their interest in estates in the county which they held jointly with their wives. The two cases were Ella Logan against John Logan, and Nola Edwards against Harry Edwards.

Custody of their children were given to the complainants. In straightening out the complication, Judge Fox ruled that the children should receive their fathers' interests in the estates. In the instance of John Logan, this amounts to about \$1,500, he and his former wife owning a property on South A street of the valuation of \$3,000. Mrs. Edwards and her former husband owned a property jointly in Centerville, which was of the probable value of \$1,000, half of this going to their child.

ADA ADAMS GIVEN A DIVORCE TODAY

Testimony that her husband had lived with her but two weeks, and that for the past four years had not provided her with a cent was sufficient evidence for Judge Fox to grant Ada Adams a divorce from Edward E. Adams. They were married in March 1907, and lived together about two weeks. She came to Richmond at an early age with her parents, who emigrated from England.
