## HATCH TWIN CHICKS FROM ABNORMAL EGG

St. Louis, April 12.—St. Louis county hens are working overtime. One belonging to John T. Apple, of Clayton, is mother of No. 1 of twins.

She is a ten months old light Brahma pullet and one day she laid an egg measuring 8½ inches end to end circumference, and 6½ inches side circumference. A week later she laid another only a trifle smaller.

Apple says these are the largest eggs of 1911 record. Another of his hens laid an egg which can almost be put through a finger ring. Its largest circumference is eight inches.

But to get back to the big egg: It was put under a setting hen and later was transferred to another hen, too keep the hatching separate.

One of the twins is like its father, a bare legged Silver Wyandotte rooster. The other "takes after" its first mother, and wears a feather harem skirt, just like hers.

## GEN. DODGE IS 80

One of Few Surviving Union Corps Commanders.

New York, April 12.—General Grenville M. Dodge, one of the very few surviving corps commanders of the Union army, celebrated his eightieth birthday anniversary today. General Dodge spends the greater part of the year in this city, though he has always retained his home in Iowa, of which state he has been a resident since 1854.

Entering the civil war as Colonel of the Fourth Iowa Infantry in 1861, he became a brigadier general of volunteers in 1862 and a major general of volunteers in 1864. After the war he returned to Iowa and resumed railroad work as chief engineer of the Union Pacific lines. He subsequently became chief engineer of the Texas and Pacific and has built more lines of railroad, it is said, than any other man in the United States. Of late years he has had large corporation interests. From 1867 to 1869 he represented one of the Iowa districts in Congress. General Dodge succeeded General Sherman as president of the Society of the Army of Tennessee, and has been commander-in-chief also of the Military Order of the Loyal Legion. He served as head of the commission appointed by the President in 1898 to inquire into the management of the war with Spain.

## London Press adopts the Sensational American Way

London, April 12.—If London is a dull town, and all who have lived in other cities assert that it is, its newspapers are in no way to blame.

Americanized newspapers, that is to say the papers that have adopted the worst features of the American sensational journalism without taking up any of its virtues, seem to have made up their mind that it is bad for the Londoner to live in peaceful enjoyment of business and pleasure, for they are continually predicting terrible calamities about or befall us. Last year we were kept in a state of constant fear and trepidation by the prospect of Zeppelin airships flying across the North Sea in the dead of night and dropping bombs into the vaults of the Bank of England and now when we had just made up our mind to enjoy the festival of the coronation and empty the pockets of the hosts of American visitors who will soon invade the country, a sensational evening paper tells that the great black plague is hanging over our heads like a Damocles' sword.

"Rats," most of us exclaimed when we saw the headlines, but papers answered:

For it is the rat which is the great source of the plague, and according to the paper mentioned within the last six months there have been plague-infected rats in the port of London, and there have been plague-infected rats, rabbits and cats in Suffolk, though the authorities are inclined to explain their disease as a violent form of distemper.

To bolster up its case the paper has interviewed one of our best known experts on the plague and although he does not feel sure that the plague will break out this year he holds out the encouraging prospect that it will surely kill us off next year unless we mend our ways
