

MARSHALL BOOMED BY JOHN E. LAMB

White House Possibility Says
Terre Haute Man on a
Washington Visit.

Washington, April 13.—John E. Lamb, of Terre Haute, after looking things over here for twenty-four hours said yesterday.

"I think Governor Marshall is in the best position of any candidate for the Democratic nomination. Keep in mind that he lives in a state which is a fighting ground, and has even been a fighting ground. Do not forget, either, that Governor Marshall is the first Democrat who has carried Indiana since Claude Matthews was elected governor in 1892."

"Governor Marshall gave such a splendid administration during his first two years that he became the controlling force in the last election that gave the Democrats of Indiana the legislature and every official in the statehouse for the first time in many years."

"Then, it should not be overlooked that under the Marshall management of party affairs the Republicans have no senators and the one lone Republican out of thirteen in congress. Why should I not insist on Marshall as a candidate for President? He comes of distinguished Virginia ancestry, from the same Marshall family that gave the nation Chief Justice Marshall, and our governor is himself noted as a lawyer. Not only do the Democrats of Indiana admire him, but he has the approbation of fair-minded Republicans because of his clean administration and sensible ways of doing things. He is careful and prudent; he not only preaches, but he practices and that means much in politics."

Kern Not A Candidate.

"What about Senator Kern as a possible presidential candidate?" was asked of Mr. Lamb.

"I have been with John Kern since I arrived here and have talked the politics of our state with him," responded Lamb, "and I do not think Senator Kern has any intention of being a candidate. Hence, I insist that Governor Marshall will have the Indiana delegation and it will be instructed for him. We, the united Democrats of Indiana, have never had a nominee for President. It is our turn. We believe the nomination of Marshall would unite the party in every section and lead us to victory. He has no manager, except that every loyal

Considerable interest is felt in Democratic circles over the burying of the hatchet between W. R. Hearst and William J. Bryan, both of whom have been in Washington for several days. Hearst and Bryan met at a dinner given by Nathan Straus, of New York, who is quoted as authority for the statement that in the future Hearst and Bryan will work in perfect accord and amity. Hearst and Bryan also met at a luncheon given by General Nelson A. Miles and this made plain the restoration of friendly relations between them.

"Colonel Bryan and Mr. Hearst," said Mr. Straus, "will in the future work together. They have agreed to forget their differences and present a united front to the country. I was extremely glad to hear them talking along the same lines and working together."

Mr. Hearst before leaving here praiser Champ Clark and expressed his belief in the brightness of Democratic prospects. "The present promising conditions in the Democratic party," he said, "have been brought about by the fact that the Democratic party under the leadership of Champ Clark has had the courage to be progressive and the intelligence to be sound in its Democracy."

This sentiment, coming from Mr. Hearst, prompted the suggestion that one of the things on which he and Mr. Bryan are in accord is the presidential nomination of Mr. Clark. It is no secret that Bryan looks with favor on Clark's aspirations in this direction and Hearst's statement would indicate that he did, too.

For there was a prediction when she moved into the Plaza, a little over a year ago, that she had thrown economy and the simple life to the winds. She had done noting of the kind. High life palled on her, and she went back to the dark and somber Hoboken flat for another year.

But Colonel Green is a large and hearty man who can't be hid under a bushel, nor in a Hoboken flat, and he insisted on seeing some of the good things of life when he took up his residence in New York. Already Mrs. Green has spent several days at the Waldorf with her son, and she seemed to like the life there well enough to continue.

GUGGENHEIM WILL RETIRE AS SENATOR


Washington, April 13.—Senator Guggenheim of Colorado has had enough. He will not be a candidate for re-election at the expiration of his term in the senate one year from next March. He has not made the announcement formally, but has indicated his purpose to retire when he has completed his present service. Sen. Guggenheim has been assailed from time to time because of the connection of the Guggenheim family with copper production. This is not understood to have influenced him in making his decision but rather a dislike for the drudgery of politics.
