INSURRECTIS CACHE GUNS ON U. S. SOIL

El Paso, Tex., April 13.—Learning that the Mexican insurgents have cached several machine guns on the American side of the border near the New Mexico line, waiting for a chance to smuggle them over the Rio Grande, the federal authorities have started a search for them. They will be seized if found.

CREW ON CRUISER SOUTH DAKOTA

San Diego, Cal., April 13.—One of the greatest feats in the history of the navy of the world was achieved by the cruiser South Dakota, of the Pacific fleet when out of a total of 35 shots from its six inch guns it scored a total of 34 hits. The shooting was done over a ten thousand yard range and at five different targets, none of which was "placed" until the gun sights were placed upon it. The shooting was participated in by the flagship California and the cruisers Maryland and South Dakota.

Targets were found by means of searchlight and this was the only aid the gunners had in placing their shots.
