TO CONTEST WILL OF GRANDFATHER

Mrs. Dill Sues in Mo. for a Greater Portion of a \$60,000 Estate.

Suit has been entered in the federal court at Hannibal, Mo., by attorneys representing Mrs. Will Dill, of this city, to break the will of her grandfather, Valentine Tapley, who died at Bowling Green Mo., in March, 1910, leaving Mrs. Dill a legacy of \$100. The bulk of the estate consisting of land of the estimated value of \$60,000 is bequeathed to Mr. Tapley's son and Mrs. Dill's brother and sister. Mrs. Dill seeks to share equally with the latter two.

Allegations of undue influence and that Mr. Tapley was of unsound mind when he made his will a few days before he died, are contained in the complaint of Mrs. Dill.

According to the provisions of the will Mr. Tapley's son receives one-half of the estate, and the other half goes to Mrs. Dill's brother and sister although it is held in trust for them by the son and in case either of them dies his or her share will revert to the son. The common law decrees that in a case of this kind one-half of the estate should go to the son and one-half to the other three heirs. Mrs. Dill to share equally with her brother and sister. Such a division would give Mrs. Dill one-tenth of the estate, approximately \$10,000.

The trial of the case will be held in the near future. Mrs. Dill is represented by the law firm of Robbins & Robbins of this city.

CONDEMNS METHODS

Chicago F. of L. Acts on Arrest of McNamara.

Chicago, May 8.—The Chicago Federation of Labor has adopted resolutions condemning the alleged illegal methods of arresting J. J. McNamara, secretary-treasurer of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Workers, on alleged charges of blowing up the Los Angeles Times building.

The resolutions contrasted the methods used in arresting McNamara and "rifling" the unions' offices in Indianapolis with those employed in "apprehending" Edward Tilden for the purpose of obtaining the packer's books and papers, wanted in evidence by the Helm senate committee.

Moral and financial support of the Federation was pledged to the three accused labor men to the end that they be given a fair trial at Los Angeles.

POOLE BREAKS DOWN

Now Complete Wreck—More Confessions Expected.

Fowler, Ind., May 8.—John Poole, the confessed slayer of Joseph Kemper, a farm hand, whose body he dismembered and buried on his farm, has completely broken down and the authorities are looking for a new confession from him.

Marshal Bowman has received a letter from Mrs. Charles Clark of 1655 Madison avenue, New York, enclosing a photograph of her husband who disappeared after working for Poole on the "murder farm" in 1910. Bowman identified the picture and a search will be made on the farm for his body.

The digging for bodies has been temporarily abandoned because of the throngs of curious persons who are flocking to the place in great numbers. The roads leading to the farm were black with people yesterday and despite "no trespassing" signs posted all over the place by Mrs. Poole, hundreds invaded the place and stared at everything and everybody.

TO INTERPRET WHAT IS MEANT BY DURESS

Attorneys for the defendants in the suit of John M. Manning as guardian of Martin Cranor against John C. Franklin and Mary Franklin to cancel and set aside deed, filed a petition in the Wayne circuit court today asking what is meant by undue influence and duress are multifarious, the same as fraud and that a true idea of what was meant could not be gained from the two terms alone.

INJURED ON FIELD OF GREAT TRIUMPH

Paris, May 8.—M. Say, the French aviator who on February third, broke the world's record for speed over a measured circular course at Issy, was today fatally injured upon the same course where he had achieved his triumph.

While testing a new biplane Say momentarily lost control of it and the machine crashed into a telegraph standard above the aerodrome. Say fell 175 feet to earth and the machine was smashed.

The injured man was picked up and hurried to a hospital where physicians held out no hope for his recovery. Say's Issy record was 75 miles an hour.

Tenth Annual State Convention Opens This Evening—The Program.

The tenth annual state convention of the Knights of Columbus, opens this evening at the local council's club rooms, at Fifth and Main streets, with a reception to delegates and visiting members of the organization. RAILROAD STRIKES STILL GROWING

One hundred Pennsylvania railroad shopmen at Ormsby and a hundred at Thompson, two hundred at Pine Creek have joined the Pennsylvania strikers.

Notice is hereby given that on the 5th day of May, 1911, there was filed in the office of the Auditor of Wayne County, State of Indiana, a certain petition signed by Perry Channess, and more than fifty freeholders and voters of Dalton Township, Wayne County, Indiana, and addressed to the Board of Commissioners of the said County of Wayne, asking for the construction of a gravel road in said township, which petition is as follows, to-wit:

State of Indiana, County of Wayne, ss:
In Wayne County, Before Board of Commissioners of said County.
Petition of Perry Channess, and others, for the Improvement of Road under the provisions of "The Three Mile Gravel Road Law."

To the Board of Commissioners of County of Wayne, State of Indiana: Petition for the Improvement of Road:

The undersigned, legal voters of Dalton Township, Wayne County, State of Indiana, the same undersigned being a majority of the freehold voters of said Township, and said Township being one in which there are not to exceed One Hundred (100) such freehold voters; and said Township of Dalton having no incorporated town or city therein, hereby and herewith petition and pray your honorable body that a certain public highway within the said Township of Dalton, and described as follows: "Being in State of Indiana, County of Wayne, Township of Dalton, and being on the Section line, running north and south, dividing section twenty-two (22) and the north half of section twenty-seven (27) both in Township eighteen (18), north, Range twelve (12) east, in said County, from Section twenty-three (23), to the north half of Section twenty-six (26), both in Township eighteen (18) north, Range twelve (12) east, in said county, the same being one and one-half (1½) miles in length," to be improved, laid out, established by

widening, grading, draining, with gravel, hereinafter set out.

Said highway is of less than three miles in length and connects at the south end thereof with the Turnpike running east from the hamlet of Dalton and at the north end thereof with the north boundary of said Township, and with county line dividing Wayne and Randolph Counties.

And said petitioners herewith recommend that said part of said highway so sought to be laid out, established, graded, drained and improved through these proceedings in petition, and subsequent proceedings thereon, be so improved as follows:

(1) That the total width thereof in improved highway be of the uniform width of thirty (30) feet, and being fifteen (15) feet to each side of said section dividing line, and that to outside of said improved thirty (30) feet it be further width to accommodate drainage of five (5) feet in width for entire length, thusmaking uniform width of forty (40) feet of said road for full length thereof.

(2) And the general character of the improvement to be made, be the establishing of proper grade thereof, and in conformity with other highway grades as far as same can be done.

(3) And the construction of cement curbs and small bridges of cement arches to have conveyed there through all waters as the necessities of drainage require.

And that the center of said highway be improved by the excavation of the soil therefrom and thereon to sufficient depth as to provide for the permanent bed and foundation of gravel to be placed therein and built up to the grade of highway, such gravel to be of varying sizes necessary for proper macadamizing construction, throughout construction as same gravel is filled in all in keeping with the most approved methods of gravel roadways.
