GAMBLING STOPPED
BY CHINESE GOVT

U. S. Consul General Says
This Is Great Victory for
Reform Element.

Washington, May 27.—The state department has a report from the consul general at Canton saying that after years of hard and consistent work, the reformers in China have caused the abolition of licensed gambling, and that this victory is next in moral importance to the stamping out of legalized opium selling.

According to the report, licensed gambling in the province has centered mainly in Canton for years, was prohibited when a vice-regal edict against it in all forms became effective in April.

"The happy eventuation of the anti-gambling movement," the report says, "was met on all sides by marked rejoicing, and was celebrated by a demonstration in Canton, in which merchants, country and people enthusiastically joined, the principal feature of which was a huge parade which passed for hours through the streets of the city and portrayed to the people by floats and tableaux the evil results which follow gambling."

The history of the anti-gambling movement in China was very similar to that of the suppression of opium smoking, and was in one way a sequel to it. The great strength which the gambling monopolists commanded was derived from the enormous revenue in taxes which the annually paid to the provincial treasury, and the difficulty which lay in the way of the government in securing a similar revenue from other sources.

Had it not been for the success of the anti-opium campaign, which gave hope to the reformers and the opening of the provisional assembly which placed in their hands a weapon of sufficient power to enable them to meet the gamblers with a chance of success, it is probable that the movement would have ended in failure.

"It should not be inferred," the report to the department continues, "that all the credit for the success of the reformers is due to the assembly. Its efforts would have been without avail if it had not fallen back for support upon the better element of the provincial population. While the assembly ostensibly led the way, it was pushed, assisted, exhorted, and prayed to by the people to fight their battle for them."

The agitation was carried on against gambling in a sane and dignified manner, and its success was largely the result of the feeling that the act of the government in licensing gambling was to the great detriment of the common people. Also the people came forward with a substitute for the revenue lost from the wreck of the gambling business, thereby depriving the officials of their one potent weapon of argument.

It was proposed at the time that this money be raised by a tax on wines and spirits, increases in salt and prepared opium taxes, and taxes on tobacco, fire crackers and butchers. The first four of these suggestions have already been accepted by the government as practicable.

The gambling question was before the assembly in Canton in 1909, during its last session, and on both occasions the members gave the movement warm support. In October, 1910, they requested the acting viceroy to memorialize the throne to set a date on which gambling would be done away with, and when the request was not acted upon the assembly summarily adjourned.

This move had the desired effect. The viceroy at once reported the matter to the throne, by whom it was referred to the board of finance. The board replied that a date would be set when a substitute revenue had been found, whereupon the assembly resumed its sitting.

"The acting viceroy arrived in Canton," according to the official account of this campaign, "and took over the seals of office on January 4, 1911. After going into the matter of a substitute revenue with thoroughness seldom seen a Chinese official, he issued a proclamation in February interdicting gambling of all sorts from the 30th day of March.

"The suppression of gambling is a reform apparently so widely popular that it is probable that no protests will be heard from the people against the new taxes so long as the revenue derived therefrom is employed as a substitute for that previously received from licensed gambling. With the suppression of gambling has come the question of providing something for the former employees of the great business to do. Statements place the number of gambling houses in Canton in recent years at 10,000, employing at least 50,000 men, and frequented by not less than the same number of professional gamblers.

The viceroy's interdiction is not confined to the suppression of licensed gambling, but covers private gambling as well, and strenuous efforts are being made to enforce the proclamation in all its provisions.

Special deputies have been appointed to watch the premises where gambling was formerly carried on, to make known to the authorities any attempt to reopen them, and spies have been detailed to visit the various "yamens" in Canton to report all cases of gambling among officials.

The experience of other governments in their attempts to break up gambling gives little hope that the Canton viceroy will be successful in his present movement. "It should be recorded to his credit, however," the report says on conclusion, "that by abolishing gambling he has removed from his district the stigma of government sanction of the evil, and that he is moving with all his resources against private indulgences therein."
