President Taft's friends make no secret of the fact that, if Hammond is selected as Taft's running mate, it will be distinctly pleasing to the President, and will tend to harmonize certain factions in the Republican ranks.

Would Have Friend

Should the much talked of arrangement go through without a hitch, President Taft, of course, being reelected as President, it is pointed out that the President with Hammond as Vice-President, would have active support as well as an enthusiastic friend in the councils of the senate. At the present time, he is without that particular brand of friendship in either house, of representatives or the senate, and it is said that this situation is partly responsible for the opposition to his Canadian reciprocity agreement.

For a long time it has been known that Vice-President Sherman has not been an enthusiastic supporter of President Taft, either as presiding officer of the senate, or as a party leader of wide influence. In fact it has been stated that, through Sherman's course in the senate, the progressives have been able to maintain their position of opposition to the President's schemes, with the support of the Democrats.

Therefore, it is pointed out, President Taft is particularly anxious to secure Hammond as aide and supporter, notwithstanding the fact that it might cost him votes which would otherwise be cast for him as President.

DUST AND TIPS NOW TAKEN BY MICROBES

Chicago, June 3.—Microbes and germ breeding dust have been banished from the cars of the Oriental Limited of the Great Northern railroad as the result of the innovation yesterday of a vacuum cleaning whisk broom which will be used by porters on the clothing of passengers in the place of the old-fashioned duster.

The use of the vacuum clothes brush for railroad passengers is the latest thing introduced by the Great Northern in the competition to provide comfort and convenience for patrons. A number of ways have been to make travel as pleasant and healthy as possible, the most recent of which was the serving of free tea in the cars of a railroad entering Chicago.

The Great Northern has gone its competitors "one better," however, in providing luxuries for its passengers.

When the Oriental Limited, the Great Northern's luxurious train from Chicago to the Pacific coast, left Chicago yesterday the porter on each car carried a full line of vacuum cleaners of every size and description in his locker in place of whisk and sweeping brooms.

The vacuum cleaners will be used for all purposes from dusting the carpet on the car floors and brushing off the plush seats to putting the proper shine on a silk hat.

The Oriental Limited, upon which the new vacuum clothes cleaning process will be used, is an entirely new train direct from the shops. Even the locomotive is new.

The train consists of ten cars which are part of the \$1,500,000 worth of equipment recently purchased by the Great Northern for use on the Oriental limited service.

CHARITY WORKERS TO HOLD MEETING

National Conference of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul at Boston.

Boston, June 3.—Prominent charity workers from all parts of the country arrived here today to attend the national conference of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, which opens tomorrow and lasts through next Wednesday. Elaborate preparations have been made by Boston and New England members of St. Vincent de Paul societies to entertain the guests and delegates and there were many social functions tonight that claimed the presence of the visitors.

As in no previous meeting of the society, the women will have a prominent part in this convention. During the conference, the women have engaged Chipman Hall in Tremont Hall as a special meeting place. The general purpose of the meetings of women at the national conference is closer cooperation in work of the society, and to discuss plans for perfecting and enlarging the scope of that kind of charitable and spiritual work that can best be done by women under supervision of the society.

The conference will open with solemn high mass at the Cathedral of the Holy Cross tomorrow morning. In the afternoon, the delegates will be tendered a reception by the Catholic Union of Boston. The general public session, or welcoming meeting will

be held tomorrow evening in the Shubert theater. Addresses of welcome will be made by Governor Foss and Mayor Fitzgerald. Archbishop William H. O'Connell, of the archdiocese of Boston, will address the meeting, followed by the address of the president of the society, Prof. William Dwight of Boston.

There will be five regular business sessions of the conference. The first session will open Monday morning, with the topic "Preventive Charity," which will be dealt with by the chairman of the meeting, Thomas W. Hynes, president of the Particular Council of Brooklyn, N. Y., and John Rea, president of the Particular Council of Philadelphia.

Other speakers at the conference are Thomas N. Mulry, president of the Superior Council of New York; Edward A. Hall, president of the Central council of Springfield, Mass.; Thomas G. Rapier, president of the Superior Council at New Orleans; Robert Biggs, president of the Particular council of Baltimore; J. L. Hornsby, president of the Superior council of St. Louis; J. H. Kohmescher, president of the Particular council of Cincinnati; Robert C. Gannon, president of the Superior council of Chicago and Lawrence Gonner, president of the Particular council of Dubuque, Iowa.

This is the first time the national conference of the society has met in Boston.

and perhaps four candidates, either one of whom might land the nomination. They are Governor Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey; Governor Judson Harmon of Ohio; Speaker Champ Clark of Missouri; and William J. Bryan of Nebraska. Already the two governors are in the running. They have been since the congressional elections last November, when both of them carried big Republican states. Since Mr. Clark became head of his party in the house and has been prominently to the fore, he will stay there, if the house under his leadership provides winning issues for the campaign.

So busy therefore, have Democratic

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politicians been lining up for and against various candidates for the head of the ticket very little time has been given to Democratic vice presidential timber. There are three possible candidates, former Governor Folk of Missouri, Governor Foss of Massachusetts, and Governor Baldwin of Connecticut. They are worthy of consideration, and will undoubtedly be considered one by one when the time comes to make the nomination.

It is apparent now that with the extra session of congress making the issues for the campaign, the regular session which begins in December, will be a short one. This means that the country will be plunged into political turmoil from four to six months ahead of time next year. It would not be surprising if the regular session ended by early spring, allowing the members of congress to hurry home and prepare for the supreme effort in November.
