

STRANAHAN URGES COMPACT SYSTEM

Centralization in the Friends' Church Advised
By Former Local Man.

In an address at Warsaw, Indiana, before the Young Friends of America, Edgar H. Stranahan of Friends college, Wichita, Kan., a former Richmond man and graduate of the local high school and Earlham college, urged "Centralization."

Mr. Stranahan is recognized as one of the leaders of the Friends, and in his address before the younger Friends, he looked into the future from the conditions of today and pointed out the possibilities of the years to come.

Among other things he asked that the publishing interests of the Friends be centralized, and that the rivalry between printing interests on behalf of the denomination be overcome. He insisted that the business and financial aspects of the publishing business be brought out a problem that should be solved by having only one authorized publishing house.

He said that there had been a time not long ago when he feared for the future of the Friends church because of the apparent lack of interest on the part of the younger people, but he said he had come to the place where he could see a change among the younger members of the church. Now they have the chance to do work, and they are doing it, not only in local communities, but in the cities. He said the young people should have every opportunity to take hold of the work of the church and that, having obtained the opportunity, they should use it. He discussed the work in cities and the possibilities there. He also made suggestions for both home and foreign missionary work, using a compact organization with one head and with officers ranging down like the organization of an army. And, he said, there is every belief that the Friends will add greatly to what they are already accomplishing.

The sessions of the young Friends this year at Winona have been unusually interesting. This is the second assembly, and the two have been held at the same place, Kosciusko Lodge being the headquarters.

The mornings have been devoted to study, the afternoons to recreation and the evenings to special addresses by leading Friends of America.

The Early Circus. Leaving out of count the great circuses of Rome and Antioch and coming down to something of modern times, the first circus in England was on a footpath known as Halfpenny Hatch, in the Waterloo road, London. There in 1770, Astley's first performance was given, with the aid of a drum, two fife and one clown. A charge of sixpence was made for the front standing places. There was no building and not even a tent, but merely a ring of ropes and stakes. Primitive as were the arrangements, Astley soon attracted good audiences and was able to add to his program conjuring, transparencies, vaulting and tumbling, with displays of fireworks. In course of time he was able to hire an inclosed ground and erected seats under a substantial roof. He called the place Astley's amphitheater riding house.



IN RAILROAD WORLD

The recent issue of the bulletin of the railroad economics shows the pay roll of rail road employees in the aggregate was almost doubled in the years 1900 to 1909. The total compensation to railway employees, exclusive of the general offices increased from a little over \$5,000,000,000 in 1900 to \$972,000,000 in 1909 or an increase of 72.3 per cent.

A new ruling of interest made by the Interstate Commerce commission which is to go in effect soon, is the date of expiration of tickets. The new ruling provides that the tickets expire at midnight of the last day, and if the expiration catches the returning passenger in transit, he will be compelled to pay the regular fare for the remainder of the journey. Formerly tickets which were presented before midnight on the last day were good for the whole trip.

According to the Pennsylvania officials the freight traffic being hauled by the road is heavy for this season of the year. The traffic in the east has fallen off slightly on account of the prevailing low prices. On the local division the officials report that the Richmond manufacturing establishments have furnished a large output considering the season.
