

## PARK LEASED AGAIN

To the Richmond Baseball Park Company

Athletic park on South Twenty-third street has been leased to Peter Hussion as manager and Daniel C. Hill as assistant manager of the co-partnership of the Richmond Baseball park company for three years, dating from May 1, 1912, by the owners Henry S. Roberts and M. Bell Cox. The annual rental will be \$225 per annum. The owners of the property made certain restrictions, among which were that no immoral or indecent practices would be permitted at the park and likewise no drinking of intoxicating liquors nor defacing of the trees in the park. The owners also have the privilege of running a fifty foot street through the south and north end of the property and may also sell lots which face on Twenty-third street, so long as these sales will not interfere in any way with the lease of the property. The lease may be terminated by the owners giving notice to the baseball company before February 1 of any year during the existence of the lease and the company shall have until May 1 to surrender the lease.

## ONLY ONE CASE OF CONTAGION IN CITY

At the present there is but one case of contagion in this city, this being a case of scarlet fever, and, according to Dr. T. Henry Davis, city health officer, it will be but a few days until the city will have no contagion. Dr. Davis says that this condition is very unusual at this time of the year, as the change in the weather unusually results in several cases of contagious and infectious diseases.

Dr. J. E. King, county health officer, received a report this morning from Webster, of a case of typhoid fever. As Clyde Nicholson, aged fifteen years was recovering from the disease his younger brother, Ernest, aged twelve years, contracted it.

## INGERMAN BREWERY CASE COMPROMISED

The one time famous Ingerman brewery at Cambridge City, at which old fashioned ale was manufactured, and which found a ready sale in all parts of the United States, is again in the possession of William H. Ingerman, as the result of the compromise of the case of Ingerman against James L. Brown and Thomas Enyeart.

Four years ago the complainant leased the brewery to John Ingerman and James L. Brown, who is a bottling agent in this city. Ingerman subleased his interest to Charles Swin, who disposed of his interest to Thomas Enyeart and, it was alleged by William Ingerman, Brown and Enyeart had failed to pay the rent. He demanded \$400. Just prior to the calling of the case on Wednesday, Judge Fox was informed that it had been compromised.

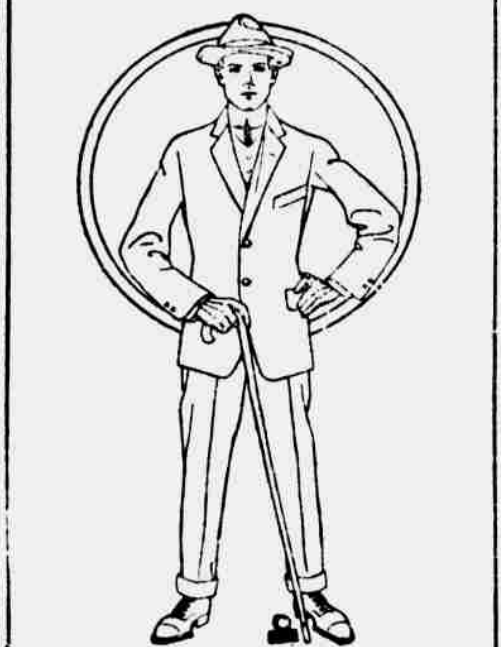

## CLOSE FOR INVOICE

Gaar, Scott Co. Shut Down for Three Weeks.

Little if any attention has as yet been paid to the reorganization of the Gaar, Scott and Company, a deal for the sale of which concern to the M. Rumley company of La Porte, likely will be consummated in the immediate future. An official of the company stated today that the deal had not progressed to such a point as to consider this phase of the transaction.

The factory is closed for invoicing and repairing of machinery, probably remaining closed for a period of two or three weeks. During this time, it is probable some consideration will be given the question of reorganization, but it is unlikely, according to the Gaar, Scott and company officials, that it will be sufficiently detailed for public announcement for some weeks.
