

PLANS COMPLETED FOR PARK EXPERTS

Will Inspect the City Monday
Afternoon and Speak
Monday Evening.

Monday evening at the high school auditorium J. Kessler, a famous landscape architect, and Dr. Jameson, president of the Indianapolis park board, will speak on the subject of parks. These two experts will give valuable advice on the improvements for Hawkins park and in the local public park system. Monday afternoon these two experts will make an inspection of all the parks in the city. Dr. Jameson and Mr. Kessler will be accompanied here by J. J. Appel, vice president of the Terre Haute, Indianapolis and Eastern traction company, which corporation is a stockholder in the Hawkins park company. The party will be met at the station by a delegation of Commercial club members, who are interested in the Hawkins park company, and the visitors will at once be taken in autos on a park inspection tour.

Subsequent to their examination of the public parks, the experts will consider two propositions for new additions to the public playground system. They will also be taken along the river bank, where they can determine the feasibility of constructing a boulevard.

The new park on the Hawkins property will receive considerable attention from the visitors. Kessler especially will be called upon to determine the most advantageous location of the artificial lake, drives, and other prominent features of the proposed park. After their excursion around the city, Jameson, Kessler and Appel will be the guests of the Commercial club park committee for dinner.

"The Advantages of Parks to a City" will be the subject of the talk which Dr. Jameson will give in the evening. He will discuss the relation of parks to the life of a community, and will tell the benefits derived from the proper maintenance of a good park system. Mr. Kessler will choose for his topic "How to Beautify Parks." In this address he will state the conclusions he derived after his afternoon's inspection, and will offer several bits of advice on improvements to local conditions. H. R. Robinson will talk on the steps already being taken to beautify the city. Several other local men will speak extemporaneously. All residents of Richmond have been invited to attend the meeting in the evening.

DIVORCE REFORM BY MEANS OF PROCTOR

New Appointee in Kansas to
Take Testimony in Ad-
vance of Trial.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 10.—A "divorce proctor," whose salary is to be paid from a fund raised by the reform organizations of Kansas City, to cope with the "divorce evil," is to be installed Nov. 13. This office was created as a result of criticism of the divorce machinery of this county. Mismatched persons, taking advantage of it, have come to Kansas City from various points and have been granted separation on slight pretexts and short residence.

The proctor will have the power to summon witnesses to go into other states and take depositions and to cross-examine witnesses at the trial here of persons who seek legal separation.

The creation of the office was suggested by Judge Thomas J. Seeborn and approved by the other seven circuit judges of Jackson county.

In the last year the ratio of divorces to marriages in this city was one to four. During the twenty-three court days of October, 1911, eighty-six divorce suits were filed here, as compared with twenty-four suits brought in the corresponding time last year. Fifty divorces were granted and seventy-four suits were filed on another day. Of the suits tried here in the last year, about 80 per cent were not contested. Of the default cases, one-third were filed by nonresidents of the state, notwithstanding the law requires persons from other states to live here a year to establish a residence.

If the alleged provocation for divorce occurs within the state, a resi-

dence of one year is not required. A Canadian couple, for instance, agreed to separate after two weeks of married life. They came here together. Upon their arrival at the Union station the husband slapped the wife. He then caught the next train for Texas. His wife got the name of witnesses to the "slapping" and after remaining here a few weeks obtained a divorce.

EMBEZZLER FREED AFTER LONG TERM

CLAIMS ARE FILED AGAINST AN ESTATE

Alleging that Luella Duddy worked in various capacities, such as washing the dishes, cleaning up the house, nursing and waiting upon, caring for and running errands for the late Mary J. Booth, for two years, one month and twenty two days, or from September 2, 1908 to March 31, 1910, suit has been filed in the Wayne circuit court demanding \$312.80 from the estate. The complainant alleges the service was worth forty cents a day. The child's father, Thomas Duddy, also has filed a claim for his own services. He demands \$96, declaring he did odd jobs and staid at the decedent's home at night for 240 days.

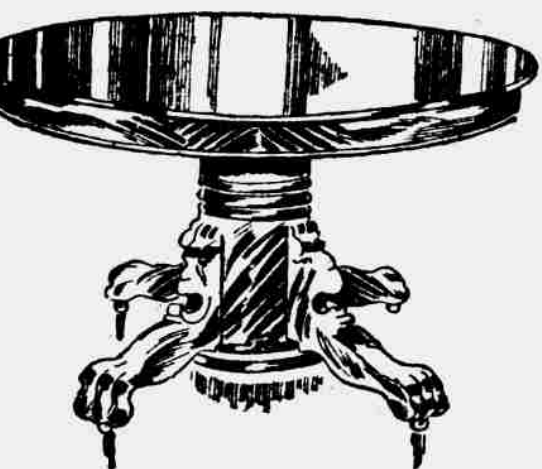

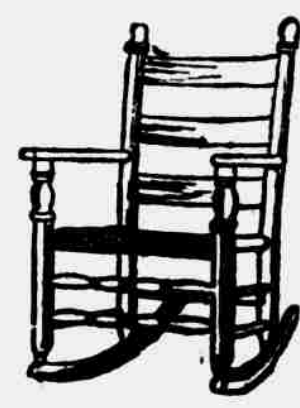
