

## EIGHTY DOGS MET UNTIMELY DEATHS

During the Local Canine Quarantine Which Was Lifted Today.

Although the quarantine ban on dogs, ordered as a preventative against rabies, was officially lifted by the city health department at midnight last night, every canine in Richmond retains its muzzle.

Dr. T. Henry Davis, city health officer, this morning announced officially that the city health department was finished with its work in the dog scare, and that he was not considering the rumored extension of the order. According to the city health guardian's views, there is no longer danger of an outbreak of rabies, and therefore no cause for issuing a new quarantine order.

A report from the state bacteriological laboratory received today by Dr. Davis, announces that no nigr bodies were found in the head of the dog killed here on suspicion last Sunday. This finding by the state board removes the last suspicion. Eighty dogs were shot by the police during the scare.

At the same time when Dr. Davis issued his order requiring the muzzling of all dogs in Richmond for a month, Dr. J. E. King, county commissioner of health, supplemented Dr. Davis' work by an edict requiring the muzzling of all members of the genus canis in Wayne Township. According to this order, although the police are powerless in the affair, Sheriff Albert Steen and his deputies are at liberty to shoot any suspicious dogs in Richmond. As Dr. King explains that his order was intended only for the country districts, it is not expected that Steen will interfere in the matter unless some unusual situation arises.

The order of Dr. King will inflict no additional hardship on the farmers, as many reports indicate that most of the dogs there have been running at large all the time.

## WILL USE MONKEYS

For Experimental Purposes—Italians Indignant.

It is rumored that the Italian population of Cleveland will present a petition to the governor protesting against this action on the ground of unseemingly cruelty to animals.

The resolution passed was substituted for one previously introduced which provided for the secession of the mine workers organization from the American Federation of Labor. It is a big socialist victory nevertheless.

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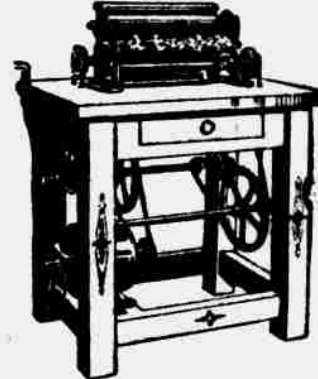
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
