

## HARRASSED BY FIGHTS

Union Men Say They Won't Sign Wage Scale.

CHICAGO, Feb. 17.—More than thirty million dollars worth of building may be tied up or entirely abandoned and a general lockout of the building trades in Chicago may come on May 1, if the various unions do not find a way to settle their internal quarrels.

Harrassed for several years by the jurisdictional fights among the union men, the contractors today announced that they would sign no new wage scales until they were assured that the union would quit fighting among themselves.

The unions are trying to fortify themselves for the threatened crisis. The employers have organized themselves into the Employers' Construction Association. Practically every big contractor in Chicago is a member. This association has been making preparations for nearly a year to make effective any lockout which it may deem necessary to declare.

## MILLER DISMISSED; GRAFTING CHARGED

WAUKEGAN, Wis., Feb. 17.—Chief Yeoman, Nathan Miller, of the Great Lakes Naval Training station was dismissed today from the service without honor for grafting.

The case has caused a sensation at the station. It is one of the most important steps yet taken by the authorities in the campaign inaugurated a week ago against petty grafters and loan sharks. The court martial was secret and the details have not been given out.

It is admitted, however, that the peculiar graft Miller was charged with practicing consisted of taking money from recruits about to be sent to service from the station.

Miller had authority to send recruits either to the Eastern or the Western coast. Recruits who wished to go to some particular part of the East or West where they had friends are said to have applied to Miller, who in return for cash, saw that they got in the places they preferred.

## PROHIBS IN MEETING

The meeting of the Prohibitionists of Wayne County was held this afternoon at the K. of P. Temple. The National and state platforms were endorsed, also the resolutions passed at the Marion county meeting with the exception of that section of the resolution condemning both the Republican and Democratic parties as conniving at vice and its attendant evils.

The candidacy of Robert Scanlon of Pennsylvania for the presidential chair on the Prohibition platform was enthusiastically endorsed.

## MILTON CHOSEN AS CONVENTION PLACE

To hold the county Sunday school convention at Milton on the twenty-seventh and twenty-eighth of May, was the decision reached at the meeting of the county Sunday school council yesterday afternoon in the Y. M. C. A. George N. Burnie, state Sunday school secretary, and Miss Lewis, elementary worker of the state association, were reported to have been secured to speak at the Wayne County gathering and the council will try to obtain some other well known religious workers to take part in the program. The regular officers, headed by Ed Hasemeier, were instructed to assume charge of the event.

The treasurer of the council reported that the \$200 obligation to the state had been fully met, and the council was out of debt. To finance the county convention and other projects of the coming year, a levy of 3c for each enrolled member will be imposed on the Sunday schools of the county.

The council determined that every township in the district shall hold an institute in March or April.

Encouragement was given to the Richmond Sunday school association which is to entertain the state convention in June, and the members of the council were asked to help make the state gathering successful.

## HARMON'S BOOM IN CHICAGO GROUNDED

CHICAGO, Feb. 17.—Judson Harmon's boom for the Democratic nomination for president has grounded locally.

The wave of enthusiasm which greeted the Ohio governor and continued for several weeks following his visit here has subsided. His managers are making no effort to keep the Harmon name before the people of Chicago and the state.

Orva G. Williams, sponsor for the Harmon boom in Chicago, said last night that he was working quietly.

"When the proper time comes we will enter the arena," said Mr. Williams. "We are working, and that is just as much as the others are doing, only our efforts are minus the amount of noise which seems to pervade the other headquarters. We will have headquarters, but nothing definite has been done in that matter."

## U. S. CRUISER SAILS

For Palmyra Island in the Pacific.

LONDON, Feb. 17.—The U. S. cruiser, West Virginia, sailed from Honolulu today for Palmyra Island, a piece of territory in the Pacific, whose possession is claimed by both Great Britain and the United States, according to a Honolulu dispatch. The West Virginia recently sailed and it was reported then that she was preparing to cruise in Chinese waters. Palmyra Island lies 550 miles southwest of the Hawaiian group.

## CHILDREN ARE SENT TO NEW YORK CITY

LAWRENCE, Mass., Feb. 17.—Two hundred children, innocent victims of the great mill strike, many of them unable to understand the meaning of all that was going on around them, and huddled together bewildered, left this morning for New York.

The little ones paraded through the principal streets of the city. Almost all the children were starting on their march, Rep. Martin Hayes of Brighton was preparing to make a fight at the state house in Boston to prevent what he terms a bargain sale of children and the parading of them through the street.

The sight of so many little ones attracted sympathy on all sides. The children were in charge of Miss Elizabeth Gurley Flynn, the Socialist writer and lecturer, and other leaders who had arranged the first shipment a week or so ago. As before, a large demand is expected at the Grand Central station in New York when the contingent arrives.
